

EXTRA HOLES PLAYED IN MEN'S GOLF TOURNEY

First Elimination Round Is Marked by Stiff Matches

NO UPSETS IN TOURNEY

Seven Flights of Women Enlivened By Five Extra-Hole Matches, One to 21st Fours

PORTLAND, Ore., May 23. — (AP)—Two extra-hole matches were played in the first elimination round of the men's Oregon state golf championship here today. One of the extra holes saw W. A. Taylor of Longview carry L. H. Nichols, Portland golf club to the 24th hole before the Portlander won out, while in the other Arlo Kyle, Riverside, and Wego, finished all square at the end of their 18 and then carried to the 20th before Kyle won.

There was nothing that might be considered an upset in the opening match round of 18 holes. Rudie Wilhelm, defending the title which he won last year, Dr. O. F. Willing, Frank Dolz and Russell Smith, all former Oregon champions advanced to the second round.

Wilhelm eliminated Dolz 2 and 1, taking things easily. Willing defeated Edward Hogan, young Riverside star to reach the second round. He played his usual steady game and won 3 and 2. Russell Smith played one of the best rounds of the day to defeat A. S. McIntyre, Alderwood, clicking off a two under par card of 70, which was only good enough to defeat McIntyre 1 up. Frank Relp took Jack Gilham, Riverside, into camp in the first round, 3 to 2.

Don Moe defeated Asa Smith, Portland, club, 2 up and Roy Moe won from Arthur O. Jones, Waverly, 5 and 4.

Two contenders from outside the state Tom Babe McHugh, Seattle, British Columbia champion, and Alec Duncan, Washington State champion, survived the first round. Duncan won from J. E. Cool, Columbia, 4 and 2. McHugh eliminated Edward Richards, Tacoma, 3 and 2. Earl O. Immel, Eugene, former president of the state association played in championship form to defeat L. D. Hepinstall, Oneida, N. Y., 5 and 4.

Women Have Great Battles
On the distaff side the struggle of seven flights of women entered in the Oregon state golf championship tournament, today was enlivened by five extra hole matches. One duel in the championship flight came to an end only after the contestants had reached the 21st green. In this match Miss Flora Jane McBride, Waverly, defeated Mrs. Harris G. Thompson of the same club one up on the 21st.

Mrs. J. R. Burke won from Mrs. Claude M. Jones, 1 up on the 19th in the fourth flight, and Miss Ninon Trenkman defeated Miss Marion Andrews on the 19th hole by a margin of one in the same flight.

Mrs. Inman Is Victor
In the fifth flight Mrs. R. D. Inman was taken to the 19th by Mrs. E. J. Griffith before Mrs. Inman finally took the bout.

The last pair of women to finish was Mrs. A. Schneider and Mrs. Charles Peberam.

They had to go to the 21st hole before Mrs. Peberam triumphed. Mrs. Kenneth S. Reed, Washington state champion, and former champion of Oregon was in fine form, especially off the tees. She breezed to an easy win over Mrs. R. Y. Hunt, 5 and 4. Mrs. Reed used her irons effectively and sank her putts regularly. She appeared to be on her game and will barring upsets, be in the finals.

HELEN WILLS IS EVEN

NET STAR CONCENTRATES PLAY ON DOUBLES

AUTEUIL, France, May 23. — (AP)—Still concentrating her play in the doubles, Helen Wills, the American and Wimbledon champion, broke even today in the two outstanding matches of the fourth days' play in the international hard court tennis championship event. Wills, with Francis T. Hunter as her partner in the mixed doubles eliminated the Anglo-French combination, Miss Joan Fry and Christian Bousquet 6-2, 9-7.

Previously, the Californian and her Virginia team mate, Penelope Anderson, were put out of the women's doubles by the French team of Madame La Faurie and Suzanne Deve. In a match decided by scores of 3-6, 7-5, 6-4.

The defeat of Miss Wills and her partner in the women's match, the biggest surprise of the day, was due chiefly to the fine playing of Madame La Faurie, who a few years ago was regarded as a possible successor to Suzanne Lenglen.

BARNES WINS ON A FOUL

GIVEN DECISION WHEN HIT ON JAW BY KILONIS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 23. — (AP)—George Barnes, Portland wrestler won on a foul here tonight in his main event match with John Kilonis, Boston grappler when the referee ended the contest after Kilonis had pounded a stiff left hook to Barnes' chin. They are light heavyweights. Barnes took the first fall in 23 minutes 29 seconds with a loin scissor.

Kilonis retaliated with a double stepover to hold and took the second fall in five minutes 16 seconds. As the match got under way for the third fall, the Boston man indicated disapproval of a Barnes' hold and smacked a sound clout to his opponent's jaw. Tonight's match ended the wrestling season here.

One American Gopher Stays

ITALIA HAS CROSSED GOAL OF NORTH POLE

Spitzbergen and at noon the dirigible radioed that the flight was progressing satisfactorily and all was well. The wind was then northeast. At 8 o'clock tonight "Italia" well but did not give its position.

The remainder of the dispatch to the Citta di Milano was in cipher, which had to be sent to Rome to be decoded. Although those aboard the Citta di Milano did not know the contents of the message, they said they assumed the Italia had flown approximately a thousand kilometers (about 670 miles).

Goal Reached by Midnight

At an average speed of from 40 to 50 miles an hour, the Italia could cover the distance between her starting point and the pole, approximately 750 miles, in time to reach her destination by midnight.

It is understood that General Nobile himself intends to make a landing at the pole with Professor

Pontremoli, for magnetic observations.

The two men will descend by means of ropes from the airship. Others may follow, depending on conditions. Precautions will be taken to safeguard those who leave the ship, for they might be faced with the possibility of being separated from the big craft.

General Nobile carries with him the oaken cross confided to his care by the pope and will set it up at the pole.
