As Secretary L. K. Cramb of the Bend chamber of commerce, The friendly greeting appropriately celebrated slicing two-thirds of the winter distance between Bend and Eugene.

The big Studebaker stage set out from Eugene for central Oregon on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, which is the regular starting time on the new eastward schedule. Carrying of passengers actually began on yesterday's return trip, and the stages will leave Bend daily at 7 o'clock. Five hours are required for the trip either way.

The oiled surface between Springfield and Wallowa was a little rough, but in fair condition, the stage passengers found. This section is to be oiled again and traffic is to be detoured by way of the Camp Creek road as was the case last year. It seemed to those in the stage that as they advanced farther into the mountains the roadway became smoother and more comfortable, and it was remarked that the Wallowa stretch was probably the roughest encountered on the entire trip.

Valley Residents Happy
 As the road-topped stage sped up the McKenzie valley, it was joyfully greeted on all sides from farm houses, resorts and wayside business places. Resumption of cross-state traffic is the real opening of the summer season in the McKenzie country, and the people there were all smiles.

The finest stretch of highway, going east, is encountered at about Nimrod inn, and continues over the pass. It has been carefully worked and is smooth and sound.

stantly. It is unnecessary here to reiterate the beauties of the superb view to be obtained from the summit of the pass.

There is almost no snow beyond the summit, and the stage dropped quickly down the grade and sped on to Sisters and Bend. The Eugene party stayed at the Pilot Butte Inn, where it was met by the Bend officials. Mayor Williamson and Councilman Large were taken on a trip to the summit of Pilot Butte, and later the city executive, with characteristic interest in matters civic, visited the Bend fire and police departments, and made an inspection trip over the city.

Journey Tireless
 The return trip yesterday was uneventful. The road was found in better condition than ever, and traffic heavier. It was an altogether comfortable and enjoyable ride, the windows of the big stage affording plenty of opportunity for enjoying the views. Despite the distance, and the heavy climb, it was a tireless trip for Mr. Reed's Eugene guests.

In some ways, it is an ideal time to visit the McKenzie country. The dust is not yet very bad, and nature is at its best. It was noted that there are many beautiful, small streams, composed of snow water, which will dry up before long.

What may be done next year in the way of keeping the pass open is not yet decided. Use of the state highway rotary plow, which may be seen at Lost Creek ranch, is believed to have opened the pass a month sooner than would otherwise have been the case this year. One condition making for good roads in the pass is the fact that the snow falls in the fall before the road has time to freeze and break up, and it is preserved in fair condition through the winter months.

MEMORIAL DAY PROGRAM NOW ARRANGED

Spanish War Veterans, Grand Army and American Legion Are Co-operating

Final plans for the observance of Memorial day, Wednesday, May 30, were completed by a committee from the Spanish War Veterans last night. The committee consists of George Thirlwell, chairman; James Russell and T. O. Russell. These men met with Comrades Tromp and Endicott of the Grand Army of the Republic.

NOBLE'S SHIP DOWN IN BLEAK POLAR ICE

on the Italia which has disappeared in a polar fog. More than 100 hours have elapsed since the big dirigible took the air for a round trip to the north pole. Her wireless gave frequent reports of the homeward flight up to early Thursday morning. It has not been heard since. Roald Amundsen and Lin-

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coln, Ellsworth, companions of General Noble on the 1928 voyage of the dirigible Norge across the pole, volunteered their services as soon as the need for rescue work became apparent. Amundsen accepted a suggestion from the Norwegian government that he head a searching party. In this he will have as assistant Captain Otto Sverdrup, a man deeply versed in the ways of the Arctic.

Offers to Join Search

Ellsworth cabled from New York his offer to join in the search. Captain George H. Wilkins and Lieutenant Carl B. Eiseon, who drove an airplane from Alaska to Spitzbergen a few weeks ago offered again to fly the northern wastes. Captain Hjalmar Riiser-Larsen, Norwegian ace, and second in command of the Norge, accepted a commission from his government to examine the possibilities of air rescue work with all possible dispatch.

The Norwegian government, itself, acting on an urgent appeal for aid from the Italian minister at Oslo, ordered a noted ice breaking ship to sail tomorrow for the north.

Russian Soviet agencies along the Arctic from the Norwegian border to the eastern reaches of Siberia, have been told by their government to be on the lookout.

ANOTHER FARM ADDED

ALL INTERESTED INVITED ON TUESDAY'S TOUR

An additional farm to be visited by those on the bankers'-farmers' tour Tuesday has been designated by O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent. This is H. E. Spickler's farm near Junction City, where the growing of rye grass will be inspected.

Anyone outside the bankers' and farmers' ranks interested may take part in the tour, said Mr. Fletcher yesterday. Those living east of Eugene need not come to the city for the beginning of the tour, but may drive to Ralph Laird's farm near Jasper, which is the first stopping place, and then visit the other farms named on the itinerary. It is intended to reach the Laird farm by 9:30. It was stated.

The afternoon will be devoted principally to seed crops in the Junction City section. Red clover will be studied at Loren and Harold Edwards' farms, Ladino clover at Mrs. Enoch Nulf's place and rye grass at the Spickler place.

Dinner will be served at noon at the Willakentia Grange hall, after one or two farms in that locality are visited.
