STRANGLER ACCUSED OF HITTING PLESTINA

MINNEAPOLIS, May 29.—(AP)—A championship wrestling match ended in disorder early today after Ed "Strangler" Lewis, heavyweight title holder, had been given the decision over Martin Plestina, Chicago challenger.

The crowd surged around the ring, threatening Lewis and referee Fred Tomeman, Chicago, who were protected by police.

Lewis and Plestina each had won a fall. In the third session, Plestina suddenly went down, apparently from a swing to the jaw by the champion, who pounced on him and headed the decision.

Plestina was unconscious for four minutes.

LOUGHNAN MATCHED FOR BOUT WITH PETE LATZO

If Tommy Wins He Will Meet Lomski in Return Fight

NEW YORK, May 28.—(AP)—Not since John L. Sullivan, mighty man of Boston, barnstormed throughout the country years ago and bounced heavyweights nightly on canvases spread in theaters, halls and even side shows, has a title champion undertaken the schedule that lies ahead of Tommy Loughnan, industrious king of the light heavyweights.

Tommy will pack his crown into Bessie's field Wednesday night and expose it for fifteen rounds to the best shots of Pete Latzo, overgrown Scranton miner, who once held the welterweight championship. If successful against pudgy Pete, Loughnan is due to battle again for Humbert J. Fugazy, on June 13, defending his title against rugged Leo Lomski over the 15 round route. The following night, Tex Rickard has Loughnan down for a stadium engagement against Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo.

Successful Bouts too Much. Unless the New York state athletic commission untracks itself from a mess of rules and by-laws governing the situation, Tommy must fight two 15-round title fights on successive nights. After accepting Fugazy's dates and contracts for Loughnan's first two bouts, the solemn solon recognized an option Rickard held on the champion's services and allowed him to name June 14 for the Slattery match.

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FILM PIRATES FEARED

CHAPLIN INSISTS THAT 'THE CIRCUS' BE PROTECTED

Insurance for \$1000 Taken Out by Manager of McDonald for Showing in Eugene

For the first time in film history a motion picture has such a rare value and is so widely sought by film pirates, as those individuals who steal films and smuggle them into foreign countries are known, that its owner-star demands that each theatre running the picture have it insured against theft during the time it is in the hands of the theatre. The film in question is "The Circus," the new Charlie Chaplin feature comedy which opens Wednesday, Decoration day, for a four-day run at the McDonald.

Written in the face of the Chaplin contract for "The Circus," a clause makes it necessary for a theft insurance policy to be taken out by the theatre, and in accordance, Manager Russell F. Brown has had written a thousand dollar policy, through the Emery Insurance agency which will protect the film from the time of its arrival in Eugene until it is turned over to the express office for its return trip.

"Chaplin has encountered several serious losses through theft of his pictures by 'pirates' who get possession of the film and either sell the print to professional amuseurs or have a duped copy made. Such prints are run in Mexico and South America for quick returns, and it is sometimes several months before officers in those countries are aware of the illegal film, by which time the thieves have severed all connections and are back in the United States," explained Manager Brown, who is taking every precaution against a loss of the film while it is at the McDonald.

A copy of the insurance policy for \$1000 made out to the McDonald, against the loss of "The Circus," will be on display in the theatre lobby late today, and may be seen there any day during the run of the picture. Another copy will be mailed to Chaplin, in Hollywood, in confirmation to the demand of the comedian for the protection of the film.

General Noble to waste the most time for polar expeditions, April and the beginning of May. He had to wait for more favorable meteorological conditions on account of his original delay.

Commander Bruns is of the opinion that General Noble, instead of consuming the last drop of gasoline, would elect to drift with his engines cut off so as to have his motors ready for a favorable landing. He considers that Noble's situation is not at all hopeless as even in the event of the freezing up of the ship, the Italia's device for anchoring on the ice would insure safety, especially if she succeeded in drifting out of the storm area and reaching a locality free from strong ground winds.

Wheat Values Take Rise

CHICAGO, May 28.—(AP)—Late rallies in wheat values today resulted largely from a substantial decrease of the United States visible supply and from complaints of crop deterioration north-west. Earlier the wheat market averaged lower because of showers in Canada and expected moisture in the American spring crop belt.

Closing quotations on wheat were irregular. 1-2c net lower to 1-3c net higher, with corn 1c to 1 1/2c up, and oats varying from 1c decline to a shade advance.

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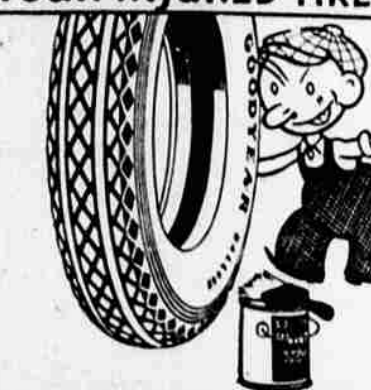
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
