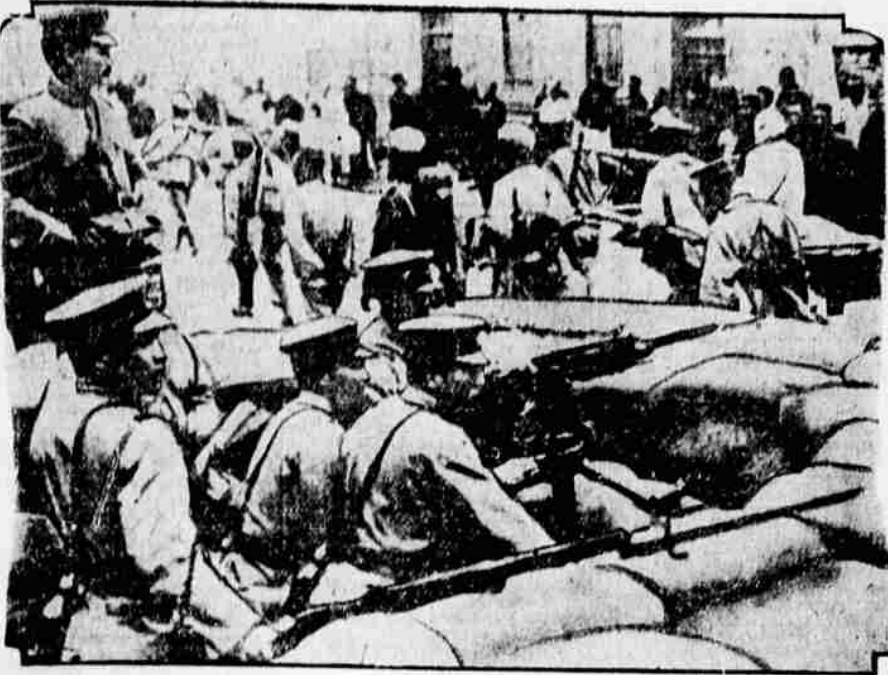


First Photo From Chinese War
