

GEORGE F. MASTERTON INDICTED FOR MURDER

Sought for Fatal Shooting
of Marjorie Stoy

SUICIDE IS ONE THEORY

Several Investigators Believe Masterton
Leaped Into the River
Following Fatal Party

PORTLAND, June 1.—(AP)—George F. Masterton, 49, sought throughout the west in connection with the fatal shooting Tuesday of Mrs. Marjorie Stoy, 32, following a drinking party in his hotel room, today was indicted by the Multnomah county grand jury on a murder charge.

Whether Masterton was dead or alive, the grand jury did not pretend to know.

If Masterton committed suicide by leaping into the flood waters of the Willamette river here after Mrs. Stoy's death, as several investigators believe, it will be four or five days before their belief can be verified.

For one week in the water, harbor police say, a body might be expected to rise to the surface where it would float.

Papers Found in River

Theory that Masterton did commit suicide was advanced following the discovery in the river of his pocketbook and personal papers. Other detectives believe Masterton threw the wallet into the river in an attempt to feign suicide and thus lead police to ill-founded conclusions.

While police were rummaging over these possibilities today, Amadeo Zancolli, proprietor of a garment factory, solved the mystery surrounding the return to the hotel of the key to the room in which the woman was killed. The key to Masterton's room was received in the mail yesterday. Zancolli told police he had found the key lying in a downtown gutter, and that he himself had mailed it. Police had been pondering on the mysterious appearance of the key to the death room, believing Masterton might have mailed it himself.

The coroner today announced that no inquest would be held over the body of Mrs. Stoy which was released to Archie Stoy, estranged husband of the woman. The body will be taken to Aberdeen, Wash., for burial.

GRAIN GROWERS TESTIFY

NUMBER FROM WALLA WALLA AT RATE HEARING

Ten Per Cent Differential in Favor
of Portland Protested
by Inland Interests

SEATTLE, June 1.—(AP)—A number of grain growers and dealers from the territory surrounding Walla Walla were called to the witness stand during the interstate commerce commission's grain rate hearing today, and added their testimony to that of previous witnesses called by the Puget Sound interests.

The Washington state board of public works, conducting the Puget Sound case and nominally representing the wheat growers of the eastern portion of the state, placed H. E. Morrison, independent dealer of Walla Walla on the stand as the star witness of the day.

Tells of Market Conditions
He told of market conditions as they have existed since the 10 per cent differential in favor of Portland diverted a golden river of grain toward the southern market. The published price of wheat at Portland was frequently fictitious, he declared.

"I never look at it," he said, in explaining that the highest bid and the lowest were sometimes as much as 2 to 3 per cent apart.

MINT TO BE IRRIGATED

SIDWELL BROTHERS WILL
WATER 48 ACRES

Forty-eight acres of mint will be irrigated this year by Leo and Clyde Sidwell of Coburg and plans were worked out yesterday for the system on their farms. Leo Sidwell will water 20 acres and Clyde 28 acres, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent.

Mr. Fletcher and W. L. Powers, head of the soils department of the state college, were on these farms yesterday and helped the owners plan the laying out of the watering systems. They will lay several main pipe lines to their fields and use small portable pipe lines and hose for the distribution of water.

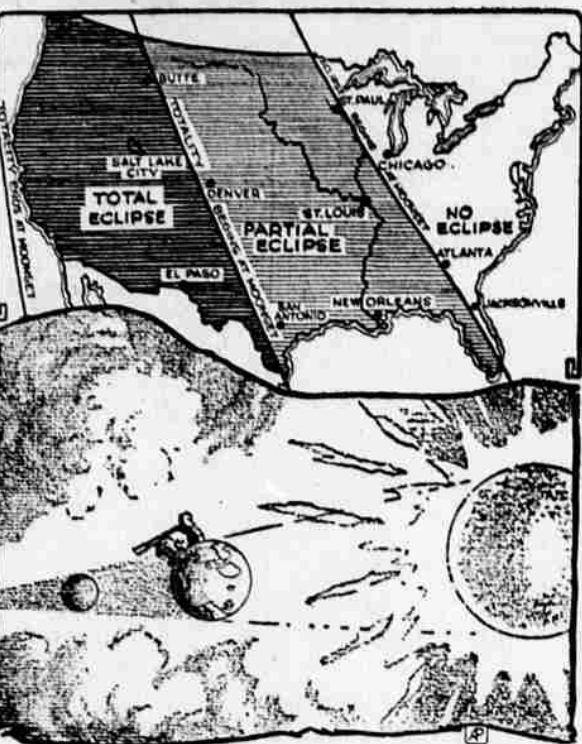
These men figure that irrigation will double their mint crop. They irrigated in a small way last year and realize the benefits to accrue from watering the land.

WESTERN U. S. SEES ECLIPSE JUNE 3

Will Be Visible in Western States and in Alaska, the First
of Two During the Year 1928



On June 3 residents of the western United States may see a total eclipse of the moon, but folk in eastern states will be denied a view of it, and must wait for another eclipse November 27. The map shows the areas in which the June 3 eclipse will be totally or partially visible.

URBANA, Ill.—(AP)—A total eclipse of the moon will occur on June 3 early in the morning.

It will be visible in the western states and in Alaska, while only the partial phase preceding totality will appear in the middle west. No eclipse at all will be seen in the eastern states and in the region of the Great Lakes.

Lunar eclipses take place when the moon passes through the earth's shadow. This conical shadow stretches nearly a million miles into space, in the direction away from the sun. At the moon's distance it is 8700 miles across, so that the moon, with a diameter of only 2160 miles, may be entirely immersed in it.

At 2:18 A. M. Pacific Time

The eclipse begins at 2:18 a. m. Pacific standard time on June 3, when the moon enters the earth's shadow. Two or three minutes later a dark notch of the shadow will be plainly visible at the moon's eastern edge.

At 3:31 Pacific time the moon is completely immersed. Total eclipse continues until 4:48, when the moon begins to emerge. The eclipse ends at 6 o'clock.

To these times add one hour to obtain Mountain standard time, two hours for central time, three hours for eastern time. Add another hour if daylight saving time is used.

Since the moon sets on the morning of June 3 between 4 and 5 o'clock, depending on the observer's latitude, it is evident that the eclipse does not begin until after the moon has set in the eastern part of the country.

Those who are unable to see the spectacle in June will not have long to wait, however, for another appearance. A second total eclipse

of the moon is predicted for November 27, and all phases of that eclipse will be visible throughout North America.

FIRST POWER PLANT PAPER
TO BE SOLD IN FALL

The \$1,250,000 bond issue voted last year for construction of a new city power plant at Leaburg will probably be sold in three blocks, according to Carl A. McClain, superintendent of the Eugene water board.

Contracts for construction of the power plant will be let within the next few weeks, but the bonds will not be sold until money is needed by the water board. The first block will probably be sold next fall.

Bids on the million and a quarter dollar power plant will be opened

next Tuesday evening. Twenty sets of plans have been taken out by contractors, but it is not expected that the number of bids submitted will be that high.
