

BUILDING FEES HIGHER

NEW CODE REQUIRES MUCH MORE INSPECTION

Copies of Regulations Now Being Distributed Among Contractors; Goes Into Effect July 1

When the new building code for Eugene goes into effect about July 1 inspection fees will take a decided jump, according to W. H. Alexander, building inspector. Much more inspection will be necessary under the new code and this is why the fees will be higher.

One hundred copies of the new code have been received by Mr. Alexander and are now being distributed at his office among contractors and others interested. The copies cost the city \$1 apiece and they are being sold at cost.

The maximum building inspection fee now is \$15 and the rate per \$1000 value is about half of what it will be after July 1. Rates under the new code follow: For buildings valued at \$20 or less, no fee; \$20 to \$100, fee of \$2; above \$100, an additional fee of \$2 for each additional \$1000 or fraction thereof up to \$15,000; above \$15,000, an additional fee of \$1 for each additional \$1000 in value up to \$50,000; above \$50,000, an additional fee of 50 cents for each additional \$1000.

Under the new code plans of all buildings to be constructed must be filed with the building inspector.

When concerns move from one building to another in the downtown district, certificates of occupancy must be obtained at his office.

was the first ever seen in Fiji and it excited the wonderment of thousands of natives and the admiration of their more traveled European and American friends.

Four priming, temporarily deaf, airmen climbed from the monoplane and asked for cigarettes as their propellers ceased whirling and it came to rest in Albert Park after a flight that made history. The cigarettes were forthcoming speedily.

Fliers Temporarily Deaf
For 34 hours and 33 minutes Captain Kingsford-Smith, his copilot Charles Ulm, Navigator Harry W. Lyon and Radioman James Warner had heard the roar of their three motors and the whistling of storm winds. Now the motors were silent and the men scarcely heard the thunderous cheers of thousands of white natives, East Indians and Polynesians who had come from surrounding districts to witness the arrival of the white man's bird from across the waters.

It was 1:50 p. m. Tuesday by Fiji clock and 2:50 p. m. Monday by California reckoning when the Southern Cross passed over Ovalau straits, separating the two chief islands of Fiji. Twenty minutes later the great plane was seen coming over the hills east of Suva at a speed of 400 feet.

clashed for the government in a decision handed down today by Federal Judge Iwan. The government filed a libel against the vessel shortly after the disposition of the criminal action against Captain Robert Pamphlet, members of the crew and the land group working with the vessel.

The Canadian Exports Ltd. intervened, and claimed the 100-foot converted halibut boat and Captain Pamphlet laid claim to her cargo, contesting the legality of the seizure of the vessel off Williams harbor early in February of 1925. It was said the decision will be appealed.

Official Welcome Given
The first to climb from the fuselage was Ulm, closely followed by the others. They were officially welcomed by Governor Hutsen, Colonial Secretary Seymour, and Mrs. Seymour, the mayor and others. An old comrade in arms named Fenton warmly grasped the hand of Kingsford-Smith.

And then the crowds that had been kept outside the bounds of the park to afford a safe landing could be denied no longer. They broke the cordons of police, and rushed toward machine and fliers. With great difficulty they were kept at sufficient distance to prevent accident to the plane and to save jostling of weary men.

Photographs were taken and then the mayor escorted the airmen to the Grand Pacific hotel for rest.

The landing was effected in clear weather contrasted with the black clouds that had troubled the fliers in the middle of their long journey. Wild excitement was shown by the thousands of natives, but arrangements had been perfected to hold them in check. Doctors and ambulances were not needed, as the plane was strictly patrolled by members of the Fiji defense force club and defense force platoon.

SALEM, Ore., June 4.—(AP)—Contracts awarded today by the state board of control for construction of the nurses' home at the state hospital for the insane total approximately \$95,500. The relative appropriation was \$130,000 for the building complete including furnishings. The general contract was awarded the Swenson Construction company of Portland, whose bid was \$12,150. There were eight other bidders. The heating and plumbing went to L. C. Tuman of Salem, bidding \$12,150. The electrical installation will be done by the Dumitres Electric company of Portland, whose bid was \$1450.

The building is to be completed by October 1. It will be three stories high and basement with accommodations for 165 persons.

COLONEL ALLEN ON DUTY

He has had long service with the national guard. During the world war he was a brigadier general in the temporary army. He will be on duty at the annual encampment at Clatsop this month.

CHANG'S TRAIN BOMBED
MARSHAL IS INJURED AND WU CHUN-SHENG DIES

BEKING, China, June 4.—(AP)—An unconfirmed report from Mukden states that Wu Chun-Sheng, the governor of Heilungkiang province, who was wounded when a bomb was hurled this morning at the train of Marshal Chang Tiao.

Same Size as Hawaii
"Viti Levu is more than 4000 square miles in extent and is almost the size of Hawaii, largest island of the Hawaiian group. It is more than 75 miles long and 50 broad and contains a mountain range with peaks 4000 to 5000 feet high. It is among the few Pacific islands with a river 50 miles long, which is navigable by small boats."

A pleasing picture of Viti Levu, the Fiji Islands and Suva is presented in the National Geographic magazine.

The temperature in the Fiji seldom is over 90 degrees Fahrenheit and is rarely below 62, the state-met said and these islands have been called the "most healthful tropical land in the world" with malaria unknown.

Important Cable Station
As for the city of Suva itself, "it is to the South Pacific what Honolulu is to the north. It is the chief cable station of the Canada-Australia cable and a regular port of call for mail steamers from Vancouver to Sydney."

It is an attractive little tropical city on a good harbor approximately two miles square. The chief business street of substantial concrete buildings, extends all along the water front and the residential sections climb the slopes behind.

"Virtually all the dwellings are bungalows, white or cream colored and usually with red roofs. Every bungalow has its broad veranda on at least two sides, and in many cases they extend completely around the house. The veranda, paradoxically is the heart of the Suva household."
