Mack Hoyt, 17, of 743 Thirteenth avenue west, may die as a result of an accident at Thirteenth avenue and Adams street Sunday afternoon, physicians at the Eugene hospital reported last night.

The boy was run down while riding his motorcycle by an automobile driven by William Flanagan, 15, of 432 Eleventh avenue west.

The Flanagan boy was arrested on a charge of reckless driving and will be tried in police court Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. He pleaded not guilty yesterday.

Young Hoyt is suffering from a ruptured spleen, a serious injury, a broken arm and bruises, physicians reported. He was operated upon yesterday afternoon and his condition is said to be very critical.

The motorcycle was going south on Adams street and the automobile when they crashed, police said. Witnesses said police reported that the Flanagan boy was driving fast, holding his hands above his head and not touching the steering wheel.

Two girls and a boy were with him. Hoyt was dragged about 45 feet after the car struck him and no evidence has been found indicating that the brakes on the car were applied before the crash, officers said. The Flanagan boy had no driver's license.

## **MRS. BIDDLE ELECTED** **HEAD P.-T. A. COUNCIL**

Closing Meeting for Year Held Yesterday

ANNUAL REPORT IS READ

Membership in Ten School Associations Now Past 1100 Mark

Mrs. Robert E. Biddle was elected president of the Eugene council of the P.-T. A. at the closing meeting and election of officers held yesterday afternoon. Final reports of the associations were given and last business was attended to.

The other officers elected were: Vice-president, Mrs. Philip A. Parsons; secretary, Mrs. Fred Schneider; and treasurer, Mrs. Roy Quinn.

Mrs. Biddle has been an active member of the P.-T. A. for several years. During the past year she has served as secretary on the council. She has also been a member of several important committees.

Mrs. Parsons, the newly elected vice-president, has been president of the Patterson school association during the past year. Mrs. Schneider is the outgoing president of the association at the Whiteaker school.

Membership Shows Gain. The annual report of the council given out yesterday by Mrs. Warren D. Smith, president during the last year, shows that the membership in the associations of the various schools has passed 1100.

Teachers have met regularly the first Monday in the month from October to June inclusive with one called meeting for the election of delegates to the annual convention.

Our state president, Mrs. Gabriel, was a visitor at our October meeting and told us of the constitutional changes to be voted on at the October convention.

"Owing to the distance and expense to La Grande the ten associations pooled their interests and two delegates were sent from the city at large elected at a special called meeting. Mrs. Lamb and Mrs. Omer represented us.

"A community chest was started for Eugene and the president automatically became a member of the general committee. Mrs. Schneider

represented the council on the board of directors. We were asked to participate in the Americanization movement but nothing developed as no special need could be found for the work.

Playground Work. Our playground work, started the year before, was brought to a successful end when the supreme court decided in favor of the levy authorized at the June election.

The work is now being handled by a city commission and playgrounds will be in operation this summer as a municipal project. Workers were furnished by the P.-T. A. to carry on one full day of the Christmas seal sale.

"The question of a savings bank system in the grade schools was discussed by the council and favorably endorsed by the grade school associations. A formal request for such a system was made to the Eugene clearing house signed by the president of the council and the presidents of the seven associations affected.

"At the state convention, a pledge of \$200 was made for the benefit of the Fine Arts building to be built here. The council voted a donation of \$25 toward this fund and recommended that each association consider making a donation in the hope that Eugene could give from \$50 to \$75 to the fund.

"Total city P.-T. A. membership is about 1100.

"Other important P.-T. A. activities were undertaken by the ten associations which make up the council. Reports of these activities will be given in the annual reports from the individual associations."

FORD ZUNKE ON TRIAL. OAKRIDGE MAN ACCUSED OF STATUTORY OFFENSE.

Ford Zunke of Oakridge was on trial in circuit court yesterday on a statutory offense, a young girl of that place being the complaining witness. Testimony was not completed yesterday and it is expected that the trial will continue until some time today.

## **TO HASTEN POISON WORK**

EFFORT MADE TO CLOSE UP DIGGER CAMPAIGN SOON

County Agent Seeks Co-operation of Supervisors in Covering Neglected Land

Strong efforts are being made by O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, to rid neglected land and government land in close proximity to farms in Lane county of the gray digger and he is sending out a letter to all rodent control supervisors instructing them to that end. Parts of his letter read as follows:

"The best season for poisoning gray digger ground squirrels is passing rapidly and I hope that all of you have been active in securing concerted community action against squirrels in your districts. In order to complete the season in good shape, all supervisors should urge their neighbors who have been negligent to poison their squirrels at once and steps should be taken to poison squirrels on lands where the squirrels have not been or will not be poisoned by the owners.

"In districts where there is neglected land where supervisors will have to poison the squirrels, this work should be done at once so as to protect this season's crops. A number of supervisors have already poisoned the squirrels on neglected land in their districts. This work should be completed before June 15 where possible and claims for the work should be presented to me before July 1.

"The bureau of biological survey of the United States department of agriculture has authorized me to furnish poison barley for use on O. & C. grant land and other government land provided farmers owning adjoining land will put out the poison. Since no taxes are paid on these lands, we can not collect pay for putting out the poison. If you have squirrel infested government land in your

district, call at my office and get poison barley for use on this land."

MEN PLAN CAMP WORK. A group of Eugene men, headed by W. R. Robertson, member of the camp committee, will go to Camp Lucky Boy, summer camp of Lane county Boy Scouts on Blue river, next week-end to make extensive improvements to the open-air chapel. A crew of boys erected a diving tower and installed a spring board at the swimming pool last Saturday and the chapel work is the only major improvement project that remains to be done.

In past years rough lumber seats have been used in the chapel, but these are unsightly as well as uncomfortable. A tree on the site will be cut down this week-end and will be saved into sections, for use as seats. Backs will be put on the log sections.
