HELEN WILLS WINS NET TITLE OF ENTIRE WORLD

America's Queen Defeats Miss Bennett in Finals

COCHET GARNERS CROWN

French Racquet Star Takes Men's Singles, Now Champion of France and England

AUTHEUIL, France, June 4.—(AP)—America's Helen Wills today became the world tennis queen of the entire world by adding the French international hard courts crown to her collection which already includes the English and American titles.

Henri Cochet of France qualified as prize contestant by winning the men's singles and becoming champion of his own country as well as England.

Both Miss Wills and Cochet met worthy adversaries, but won a decisive fashion, benefiting a champion, Miss Wills swept to victory over Miss Ellen Bennett of England, 6-1, 6-2, while Cochet, playing inspired tennis, downed his redoubtable ex-steyman, Rene Lacoste, the defending champion, in the first round of the French title, by scores of 6-7, 6-3, 6-1, 6-3.

No Match For Helen
The clutchy Miss Bennett, whose play earlier in the tournament stamped her as probably the best woman player in Europe, was no match for the hard hitting American girl and gave her no more serious opposition than Miss Wills' four antagonists of previous rounds. Like them, Miss Bennett was unable to score more than three games while Miss Wills was making the requisite 12 for a straight set victory.

Early in the second set when Miss Bennett was forcing the play Miss Wills opened up with a burst of hard-hit ground strokes for "elements" which brought her point after point. Miss Bennett's last rally came in the seventh game in which she managed to break through Miss Wills' service, but the effort told in the next and final set she was able to score but a single point.

"This was an enjoyable match," was all Helen would say.

Miss Bennett took her defeat philosophically. "It is no disgrace to be beaten by such a wonderful player as Helen," was her comment.

Miss Wills' victory was won in characteristic fashion after she had dropped the first game to her opponent.

Today's Golf Lesson

Getting Out of Bunkers
While all of us prefer to avoid them, recovering from bunkers is not such a difficult thing to do as is generally believed. It is an art that has to be mastered and especially now when the greens are continually being made smaller and protected by an increasing number of bunkers.

Bunker shots are of three main types. There is the explosion shot in which you are called upon to blast your way out of the sand; the chip shot in which you nip the ball off the top of the sand in the event that it lies well, and the out shot.

Of these the explosion shot is the one most often used, especially by average players who have not acquired the skill that is necessary to play either of the other two types with success. There is no choice when your ball is buried in the sand or when it is lying in a heel-point. You've got to blast it out then and you've got to use your niblick.

For the explosion shot you've got to be firm on your feet and that is the reason why you so often see players work their feet down into the sand. The general practice is to play the ball off the left foot. The club is taken near the end, the swing is a full one but the stroke does not necessarily have to be an excessively hard blow.

In playing this type of shot one thing should be kept in mind and that is the idea of getting out. The mind should not be bothered by any other thought. Range is governed by two things: the amount of sand taken in back of the ball and the loft of the club. If you are forced to get a little distance besides recovering from the bunker you've got to aim on taking a little sand as possible. If distance getting is not a consideration you take more sand and lay the club back a trifle. There is still another thing to be determined and that is something you'll have to learn by experience. thoroughly discussed, along with a number of other questions, and some decisions were reached, but no change was made in the rules regarding professional players.

"The rule which was in existence before the meeting and which is still in existence declares a man ineligible who plays on a team on which any member is paid for participation." Professor Howe said. "This is the national amateur athletic union ruling and was changed by the faculty representatives in no way whatsoever, so any belief that the meeting resulted in alteration of the rules that might seriously injure college athletics is unfounded. The principal decision reached by the faculty members concerning the baseball question was that a definite effort be made to see that those players who are clearly ineligible under the present rule be declared ineligible and be kept from college competition."

A matter of greater importance probably than the much discussed decision regarding baseball was the ruling adopted to limit the eligibility of athletic club athletes, according to Howe. The ruling provides that participating on a club team which competes against college athletic squads shall count as regular college participation. Thus if a man who has never entered college play one year on a club team which takes part in college games or meets, the athlete thereby loses his freshman year of competition. If he plays two years more years of competition.

Provided a man plays his freshman year and then takes part on an athletic club team, he loses one year of varsity competition for season of club participation, until he has utilized his entire eligibility. The ruling has no effect on club teams which do not meet college competition.

The revolving annual schedule which was suggested to the faculty members some time ago and which was worked out to cover a four year period, was not accepted at the meeting. The plan provides that each school in the conference play every other school in the conference at least twice in the course of four years.

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"Crime is contagious," he declared. "and if the government becomes a law-breaker, it breeds contempt for law; it invites every man to become a law unto himself; it invites anarchy. To declare that in the administration of the criminal law, the end justifies the means—to declare that the government may commit crimes in order to secure the conviction of a private criminal—would bring terrible retribution. Against that pernicious doctrine this court should resolutely set its face."
