AD WRITING CONTEST TO RUN ANOTHER DAY

McDonald Theatre Receives Many Good Specimens from Lloyd Admirers

The second day of the "Speedy" ad writing contest now being sponsored by the McDonald in conjunction with the showing of Harold Lloyd's new comedy, "Speedy," which opened its four-day run there on Monday, brought out even better specimens of display ads than the first day, advises the management.

dirigible this morning but that the location could not be learned. Two other Siberian stations also reported hearing the same calls. In addition the trawler Loutchinski, off the Murman coast, reported hearing calls believed to be from the Italia but that she could not pick up actual communication because of atmospheric interference.

Believes Italia is Located At the same time that it rushed preparations to survey Franz Josef Land the rescue commission made public a statement this morning expressing belief that the Italia finally would be located on Franz Josef Land.

Franz Josef Land was discovered in 1867. It is approximately 900 miles from the Kola peninsula and lies just along the approximate limit of open water. Between it and the Russian coast is Barents sea, a wide stretch of icy waters across which the ice pack moves until it reaches an approximate limit of about 100 miles from the Russian coast.

It is an uninhabited archipelago and supports some animal and bird life as well as slight vegetation along the shore line, glaciers raising perpendicularly in the interior.

TEACHERS TO QUIT UNION

TUTORS IN SEATTLE VOTE TO SIGN CONTRACTS SEATTLE, June 5. (AP)—Union teachers in the Seattle high schools today voted to withdraw from the American Federation of Teachers and to sign the contracts for the ensuing year offered them by the school board.

The contracts include a clause expressly renouncing their right to belong to a union while teaching in the Seattle schools. L. A. Morrow, president of the local union, announced the teachers' decision, and resigned his office. He said the decision was reached in an effort to avert threatened reorganization of the teaching staffs of the high school.

NEWPORT, Ore., June 5.—A young whale last night fell prey to six men in automobiles. Stirred by reports of an unusual competition on Monterey Beach, near here, the party of motorists investigated and found a young whale being pounded to death on lashore reefs as it was making a desperate effort to get back to sea. The men lassoed the sea animal and used their automobiles to tow it ashore. It was estimated to weigh 500 pounds.
