ONLY TWO PERIODS WILL BE HELD AT SCOUT CAMP

75 Boys Instead of 50 Will
Attend Each Period

LONG HIKE PLANNED

Trips to Be Taken to Lookout Sta-
tions in National Forests;
Health Is Important

Only two periods will be held at
summer camp of Lane county Boy
Scouts this year instead of three
as previously scheduled, the camp
committee of the Lane county
scout council has decided. The
change was made chiefly to cut
down overhead expenses.

Seventy-five boys will be taken
care of during each period instead
of 50 as planned for the three-
period camp. The first period will
start July 9 and continue until
July 23. The second will be held
from July 23 to August 6.

While the daily program will be
carried out at camp, it was said at
headquarters yesterday, a separate
hiking program is also planned.
Two or three day hikes to Castle
Rock lookout station in the Cas-
cade national forest and to Car-
penter mountain and Tilt Bits look-
outs in the Santiam forest are
planned.

On account of the hiking pro-
gram, each boy attending camp is
urged to come equipped with ade-
quate hiking equipment, including
footwear and knapsacks for car-
rying blankets and food.

List Is Published

Suitcases should be left at home,
members of the camp committee
say, and knapsacks be taken in-
stead. A detailed list of what to
take to camp was published at
scout headquarters yesterday and
all who plan to attend are urged
to get copies there.

Health of campers is of import-
ance at camp, it was said, and in
order to determine whether a boy
is in proper physical condition for
camp activities he will be asked to
undergo an examination by a phy-
sician within 48 hours before going
to camp. The extent of the boy's
activities will depend on the phy-
sician's report.

While the supply of drinking
water at the camp comes from a
spring at the foot of the moun-
tains, extra precaution is being
taken to see that it is pure. A sam-
ple of the water will be analyzed.

BAKE SHOP REMODELED

NEW LOCATION ON BROAD- WAY BEING REPAIRED

The building at 72 East Broad-
way, to be occupied by the Ideal
Bake shop, will be extensively re-
modeled before the bakery moves

Another permit was issued yes-

well for erection of a garage at 530
Twelfth avenue west at a cost of
\$200.

Mr. Alexander turned over
\$527.19 to City Recorder George A.
Gilmore yesterday. The money
was taken in at his office in May
and is the largest sum received in
fees in any month so far this year.
A total of \$190.55 was taken in for
39 building permits, \$174 for 49
plumbing permits and \$232.55 for
92 electrical permits.
