

5731,087 EXPENDED BY FIFTEEN CANDIDATES

Figures Given Out by Senate Campaign Probers

HOOVER SPENT \$380,822

Governor Smith Had Expenditures of \$121,471.04 According to Figures of Committee

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 6.—(AP)—Fifteen candidates for the presidential nomination in the Democratic and Republican parties have spent \$7,310,877 to date, upon their campaigns, figures given to the senate campaign funds investigating committee disclosed.

The expenditures compiled from the testimony before the committee by accountants, were made public today by Senator Stetwer, Republican, Oregon, the committee chairman. The figures show that 12 of the candidates received contributions to their campaign totaling \$6,823,023.72, a deficit of \$48,058.22.

Hoover Outlay Largest

Secretary Hoover, in his fight for the Republican nomination, according to the committee's figures has spent in his behalf more than all of the other 14 candidates. Hoover's expenditures were placed at \$3,309,822.11, with the remainder of the field totaling \$3,501,255.64. However, his campaign shows a deficit of \$41,793.90, as the total contributions to his campaign were fixed at \$3,359,028.21.

Governor Smith of New York, had the largest expenditure of the candidates for the Democratic nomination with a total of \$1,214,471.04. His campaign also shows a deficit of \$559.64, with contributions fixed at \$1,219,030.68.

Former Governor Lowden of Illinois, ranks next, with expenditures of \$60,922.90. Lowden, however, has a balance left in his campaign fund for his receipts are placed at \$63,132.20.

In the Democratic list, Senator Reed of Missouri, ranks next to Smith, with expenditures of \$38,752.79, while his receipts show a total of \$41,430.64.

Vice-President Dawes was reported to have expended \$579.50, and received as much in contributions.

ed to start for Brisbane, Australia, at 4 p. m. today, which is 5 p. m. Wednesday on the Pacific coast of the United States. The flight will be one of 1762 miles across the South Pacific ocean, in continuation of the 7300-mile air journey from Oakland, Cal., to Sydney, Australia.

The plane left Suva at 11:04 a. m. today (3:04 p. m. Wednesday, Pacific coast time), for the beach at Naselai.

The fliers and their plane were given a great send-off by the largest crowd ever assembled in Suva, as their plane rose from Albert park for the short jump to Naselai beach. As the great machine took off beautifully from the lawn of the park, the mixture of all races—Europeans, Americans and Polynesians—cheered wildly and shouted good wishes and farewells in many languages.

Honors Accorded Navigators Since they arrived here at 2:23 p. m. Tuesday (6:23 p. m. on Monday, Pacific coast time), Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and Charles Elm, the Australian pilots, and their American companions, Navigator Charles Lyon and James Warner, had been given great honors by the native chiefs and had received the official welcome of the British colonial governor and other officials.

At Naselai beach the Southern Cross was to take aboard its fuel supply of gasoline. Awaiting her were 500 gallons of gasoline. The three miles of hard sand of the beach was said by Kingsford-Smith, the commander, to be one of the best runways in the world. He expressed confidence of taking off easily and believed that the Southern Cross would roar away the 1762 miles to Brisbane in 18 hours or less. At least, he thought the plane would reach Brisbane by noon of Friday (4 p. m. Thursday on the Pacific coast).

All weather reports for the flight were favorable. The wind at Naselai beach was east-northeast, four

FELSTEAD, GREAT BAY COLT, IS DERBY WINNER

Almost Forgotten Racer, 33 to 1 Shot, Triumphs

BOOKMAKERS HARD HIT

Event is Attended by Greatest Throng Ever Gathered at Old English Classic

EPSOM DOWNS, Eng., June 6.—(AP)—The flying feet and courageous heart of a great bay colt which experts had quite forgotten, drove Felstead, a 33 to 1 shot up from the ranks of the "also rans" of horse-racing today, to win the English Derby before the greatest throng ever gathered for the supreme racing classic of old England.

More than a million horse lovers, swarming over the rolling turf and environs of Epsom Downs, roared their acclaims of the new monarch of three-year-olds. Sir Hugo Cunliffe-Owen's smashing youngster romped to victory over eighteen of the country's thoroughbred leading Flamingos by a length and a half, with Black Watch third, and the favorite, Lord Derby's Fairway, ninth.

Royalty of mankind and hundreds of celebrities were in the vast assemblage that came to pay homage to the royalty of turfdom. So vast was the multitude that King George and Queen Mary, battling through the crowds with the Prince of Wales scarcely were able to reach their box. It seemed as if every clerk and stenographer in the country-side had gathered for the general holiday that marks the annual derby day.

Handsome Colt Cheered When the mile and a half battle over the Donup rolling turf was over, the new racing king met England's royalty face to face, wreathed in derby glory. Felstead, with his owner, and with his beaming jockey, H. Wragge, on his back, pranced to the king's box and took his bow, while from every throat rose a cheer for the handsome colt, bay son of Spion Kop out of Felkington.

Smashing aside betting odds greater than any other horse has been able to overcome in nine years, Felstead, with a record of finishing in the money but once up to today, coasted home with a length and a half lead over Sir Lawrence Phillips' sturdy colt, Flamingo, which led Black Watch to the wire by six lengths.

Bookmakers who take a bet, large or small, on some horse from almost every person in the land on this day, reported scant profits because of the long price on Felstead and the heavy backing Flamingo gained to finish second. The favorite, Fairway, was not backed by the public to get great extent.

Because Felstead's victory today was unexpected his tickets in Sunday's sweetstakes were barred sharply from hand to hand and the lucky winners hardly discovered. The holder of his number in the huge Calcutta sweep gets \$262,000 (approximately \$1,310,000) but the identity of this

MEXICO AND CATHOLICS TO AMUSE DIFFERENCES

Morrow, United States ambassador to Mexico, who is here on leave, declined tonight to make any comment either on the situation in general or on the negotiations which Archbishop Leopoldo Ruiz de Michoran, is reported to be conducting with the Vatican in Rome for a settlement of the difficulties between the Calles government in Mexico and the Roman Catholic church.

Total Amount of Cash in the State Treasury on June 1 was \$4,941,155.71
