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CHERRY CROP IS FAIR

ROYAL ANNES YIELD BETTER THAN LAST YEAR

Sour Varieties Will Be Short Says C. E. Stewart, County Fruit Inspector

The Royal Anne cherry crop in Lane county will be better than that of last year, notwithstanding the late cold rains during pollenizing time, said C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector yesterday.

The sour cherry crop will be short, he said, and is expected to be about a third of a normal crop in this section. The weather was too wet when these cherries were in blossom. The Royal Annes blossomed later and had the benefit of some good weather.

This is the first authentic report of the condition of Lane county's cherry crop. Reports had been made that the crop would be practically nothing on account of the bad weather conditions but as a rule the growers will have a fair yield, it is stated.
