BRECHTEL IS NOMINATED

PETITION IS FILED WITH SCHOOL CLERK

If Nominee Accepts, Two Men Will Be Out for Position Being Vacated by J. T. Evans

A petition nominating Charles H. A. Brechtel as candidate for election as school director was filed yesterday with G. H. Jones, clerk of the Eugene school district. The petition was placed in circulation earlier this week.

Mr. Brechtel has not yet filed an acceptance of the nomination but he may do so until five days before the election, which will be held Monday, June 18.

Only one directorship will be filled this year. John T. Evans, retiring director, has decided not to seek re-election. If Mr. Brechtel accepts the nomination, there will be two men out for the job. Dr. D. C. Stannard filed his certificate of acceptance some time ago.

Two Juries Disagree
UNABLE TO REACH VERDICTS IN COURT CASES

Zunke Case and McClain Case Are Expected to Be Tried Again; Evans Up Next

Two juries in circuit court disagreed yesterday and Judge Skippworth was compelled to discharge them. The jury in the case of the state against Ford Zunke, which was out all night, was discharged at 9:30 yesterday morning. It deliberated for 22 hours.

The other jury was in the case of the state against John McClain, charged with issuing a check without sufficient funds in the bank to cover it. It went out before noon and was discharged by the judge about 9:15 last night as no verdict could be reached. Both cases are expected to be tried again.

The next case to come up for trial is that of the state against Leo Evans, charged with burglary at Oakridge.
