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SOUTHERN STATES HIT

MANY HOMELESS AS RESULT OF STORMS, SIX DEATHS

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 6.—(AP)—With the most acute situation in Crenshaw county, Alabama, where a hurricane has made more than 100 persons homeless, for southern states tonight were checking damages from torrential rains, floods and storms.

Conditions attributed to the weather have caused six deaths and many persons have been injured. The affected zone extended from middle Georgia, across southern Alabama and Mississippi into Louisiana, streams in the last three states piled out of their banks by incessant rains were on rampage, threatening to wreak considerable more damage before the floods flow into the Gulf of Mexico.

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MRS. SIPPEL HEADS CLUB

IS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF GENERAL FEDERATION

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, June 6.—(AP)—Mrs. John F. Sippel of Baltimore was elected president of the General Federation of Women's clubs here today, defeating Mrs. Edward Franklin White of Indianapolis by approximately 150 votes.

Prolonged applause greeted a declaration by Dr. Valeria Parker of New York that the old form of monogamous marriage is the form that is going to stand the test of time, during an address before the convention today.

Dr. Parker said that she did not believe companionate marriage would endure. "I am sure," she continued, "that biologically and ethically the old form of monogamous relationship is going to stand, because it meets the needs of human beings."
