EQUIPMENT FOR SUMMER NOW UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Place Ready in Park North of Butler; Frank Baker, Director, to Come Here June 15

Supervised playground work in Eugene this summer will start June 20, it was announced yesterday by members of the playground commission. Equipment is under construction and a site for a playground prepared in the city park north of Skinner's butte.

Frank Baker, physical education instructor of Pasadena, Cal., will supervise the work here. Assistants will be William Sorsby, Scott Milligan, Frances Elizabeth Baker, Marjorie Horton and Jo Ralston. Mr. Baker will come here about June 15.

Three playgrounds will be operated in addition to the one in the city park. They will be at the Lincoln school, the Frances Willard school and the Condon school. Swimming equipment will be installed in the park playground, a tennis court will be reserved at the University of Oregon and a railing will be placed around the top of the butte water reservoir for skating.
