

CHINESE FRUSTRATE OPIUM SUPPRESSION

Poppy Continues as Cause
of National Unrest

TRADE STILL ENDURES

Inspectors Beaten, Their Marines
Routed by Villagers and Re-
treat in Disorder

FOOCHOW, China (AP)—Opium, for centuries past the cause of wars throughout China, continues as one of this nation's principal causes of disorder, dishonesty and unrest.

Efforts have and are being made throughout China to abolish the trade, but the revenues to be derived from the traffic and the habit, clamped as it is on many of the population, prevent and frustrate much of the effort made for abolition.

Enthusiastic sounding programs for opium suppression have been issued by the various Chinese governments and the legations of warlords, big and little. But few of them seek to accomplish the smallest part of their proposals.

A vivid example of the working of the Fukien, provincial opium suppression bureau, exposing the difference of opinion existing as regards the drug, has come to light here. Two opium inspectors from the county seat of Futsing, near here, proceeded, accompanied by a platoon of Chinese marines, to a nearby village looking for opium.

The villagers resisted the search and in the fight that followed two villagers were killed, the marines were overcome by sheer numbers, a considerable part of their force was severely beaten and the opium inspectors and marines alike retreated in disorder to Futsing.

One of the inspectors, a Chinese of the old style with long flowing whiskers, characteristic of a former generation of Manchu authorities, was forced to submit to having his whiskers pulled out by the roots. Since this incident there has been no attempt by the authorities to supervise or inspect opium activities in that neighborhood.

About Futsing there are hundreds of poppy fields for opium production. The suppression bureau collects a high tax for allowing poppy growing and no effort is made to destroy the fields.

VERMONTERS FOR HOOVER

One of Their Number Ready to
Second His Nomination

KANSAS CITY, Mo. June 11.—(AP)—Delegates from Vermont, native state of President Coolidge, agreed today to vote solidly for Herbert Hoover and to have one of their number second his nomination.

W. R. Austin of Burlington, was selected to make the speech seconding the nomination of Mr. Hoover. The decision was reached at a conference including Earl Kinsley, national committeeman for Vermont; Mr. Austin; Senator Moses of New Hampshire, a Hoover lieutenant, and James Good, manager of the Hoover forces.

"Vermont always has taken President Coolidge at his word," said Mr. Kinsley. "We, of all, can best be the ones to insist him by voting for him in the face of his statements. Of course we are for Coolidge if he is a candidate. We know he is not."

VARE DELEGATES LINE UP

Senator-Elect Believes Coolidge is
Out of the Race

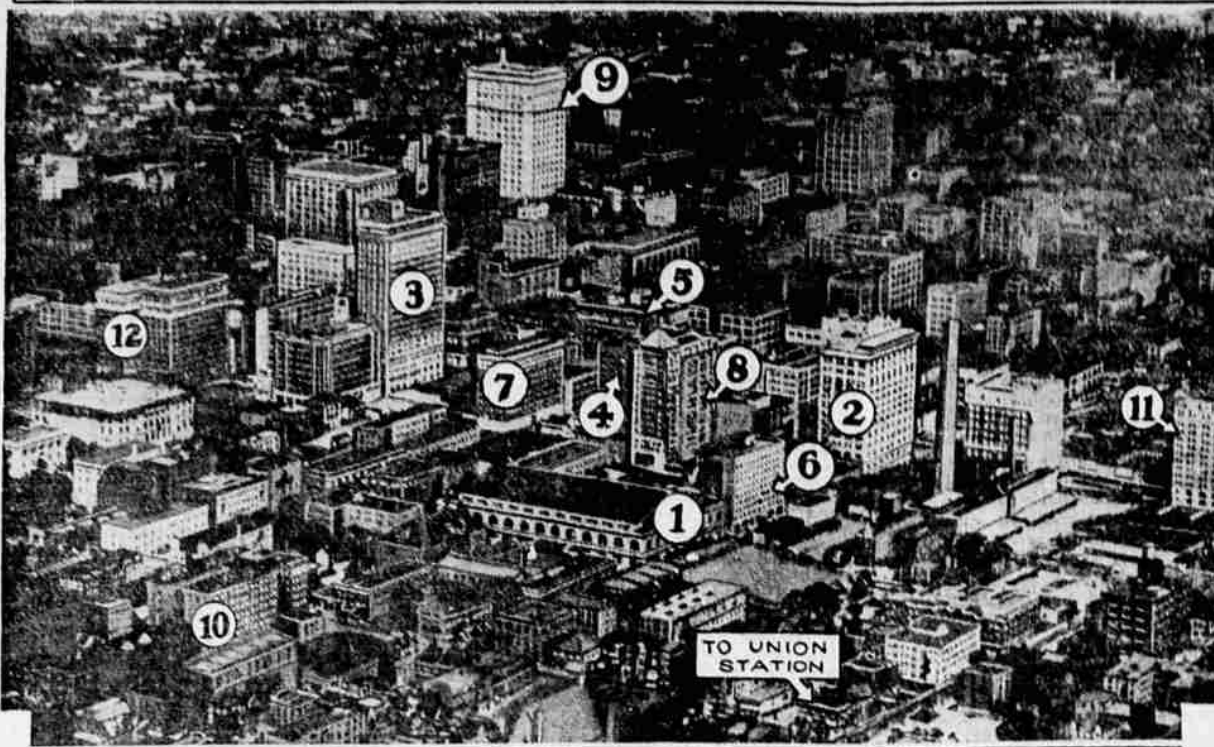
KANSAS CITY, Mo. June 11.—(AP)—An emphatic declaration in favor of the candidacy of Herbert Hoover was made tonight by Senator-elect William S. Vare of Pennsylvania, who controls a large block of delegates from his state.

Declaring that he was convinced of the superiority of President Coolidge's statement that he was out of the race, the boss of the Philadelphia Republican organization said he would use his influence at the caucus of Pennsylvania delegates tomorrow to have Secretary Hoover's candidacy endorsed.

Vare's statement was issued less than half an hour before Secretary Mellon, regarded as holding the key to the whole presidential nomination situation, conferred with correspondents after he had made a canvass of the situation here with Senator Curtis of Kansas, one of the presidential candidates; Representative Hull, of Illinois, a supporter of former Governor Frank O. Lowden, and other party leaders.
