BANCITALY STOCK SAGS

STARTS FRESH TORRENT OF SELLING ON MARKET

High Priced Speculators Hardest Hit in General Slump of Issues in Trading

NEW YORK, June 11.—(AP)—The sensational collapse in the market price of the Bancitaly common stock on the New York curb market, started a fresh torrent of selling on the New York Stock Exchange today.

High priced speculators, particularly those in which there has been wild public speculation, were the hardest hit. Rosalia Insurance scored the largest break, dropping 2 1/2 points to 17 1/2. Curtis and Wright each fell about 12 points to 10 1/4 and 10 1/2, respectively, as compared with their recent highs of 22 1/2 to 24 1/2. American Bank Note, Case Threshing, Cushman's Bakery, Jewel Tea, National Leather, Frank G. Shattuck, and U. S. Cast Iron Pipe dropped 8 to 10 points. General Motors closed with a block of 12,999 shares at the spread price of 18 1/2 to 19 1/2, an extreme decline of 6 points.

American International, American Railway Express, American Water Works, Raytek, Clearing, Chrysler, Electric Automobile, Houston Oil, International Combustion, International Match, International Telephone, Matheson Alkali, Park and Tilford, and Universal Pipe dropped 5 to 7 points.

Such seasonal industries as American Telephone, Anaconda Copper, General Electric, Montgomery Ward, Texas Gulf Sulphur, and U. S. Steel closed at net declines of 2 to 5 points.

TOURIST OFFICE PLANNED

BUREAU IN LOS ANGELES TO SELL OREGON

W. G. Ide, of Oregon Chamber of Commerce Outlines Plan at Directors' Meeting

W. G. Ide, manager of the Oregon state chamber of commerce, was present at the meeting of the board of directors of the Eugene chamber last night. Mr. Ide met with the group in the interest of the establishing of an Oregon office in Los Angeles to tell tourists about our state.

In the past it has been shown that most of the new residents that come to Oregon come through California. With this in mind the state chamber of commerce believes that if an office was established in Los Angeles and an effort made to interest prospective Pacific coast settlers in Oregon the returns would be very great. Mr. Ide is visiting all of the chambers of the state and is seeking aid from them toward this new enterprise.

The directors also gave Mr. Ide's move to solicit membership in the state chamber of commerce locally. In the past few years no soliciting of memberships has been done in Lane county by the state chamber. Most of the help has come from Portland alone. It is felt that the entire state should take part in the activities, however, and memberships are to be solicited in all sections in the near future.

An advertising plan whereby signs along the highways of the state would be used to advertise Eugene was turned down by the directors. The plan of the city council planning commission to adopt a master plan for Eugene was given the endorsement of the chamber.

Professor A. L. Lomax of the university school of business administration gave a report of the industrial survey which is being carried on by members of that school.
