

NAME OF JOHN HALL MAY NOT BE PUT IN RUNNING

Oregon Delegation Is Lined Up Solidly for Hoover

MAY CAST FIRST BALLOT

Possibility Is Seen That He Will Release the Delegation from the Obligation

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 13.—(AP)—Indications were seen here tonight that the name of John H. Hall of Portland, Oregon's candidate for vice-president, may not be presented to the Republican national convention.

The Oregon delegation, solidly for the Hoover program, and apparently willing to line up behind the candidate acceptable to Hoover leaders for vice-president, find in their way their primary instructions to support Hall for second place on the ticket.

In view of the fact that he was a candidate only because he permitted his name to be used to forestall the vice-presidential preference vote of the state Republicans going to some unavailable candidate by default, the possibility was seen that he might see fit to release the Oregon delegation from its obligation to vote at least one ballot for him, and permit them to line up from the start with other Hoover states on the vice-presidential selection.

Center to Propose Hall
Arrangements have been made for William A. Carter, Portland attorney, to place Hall's name in nomination before the convention as Oregon's candidate. As far as is known, this plan will be adhered to, and the state's first ballot will be cast for him unless he waives the honor and so instructs the Oregon delegation.

Hall entered the race, Oregon delegation leaders explained, primarily to keep the state's vice-presidential vote from being given to William Grant Webster, who filed for the place in the past four presidential years. In 1912 he won the Oregon vice-presidential vote, and the delegation was forced under the law to support him for one ballot. Webster is not an Oregon man.

Delegation Favors Daves
Sentiment on the vice-presidential policy among Oregon delegates tonight appeared rather definitely centered around Vice-President Daves. Some sentiment was expressed for Senator McNary, but Charles R. Harbord, if their candidacies are strongly advanced and acceptable to Hoover leaders, Senator Moses of New Hampshire was mentioned as a candidate who might expect favorable consideration at the hands of the Oregon delegation if Daves proved unavailable.

The principal concern in the minds of the delegates seemed to be to find a strong running mate available for Hoover, geographical location and other elements of the political situation being considered.

their shoulders that "you will see in November."

In Sympathy With Affairs

Even as they marched away Moses was telling the delegates that "no one can doubt the essential sympathy with which the Republican party has always looked upon the great and diverse interests which make up the fabric of our national existence."

"This sympathetic viewpoint has not changed," he said.

"Agriculture and industry and the social order continue to be the prime objects of our solicitude and in dealing with them the Republican party will not shrink its responsibility."

"We shall, however, now as always, chart our course within the limits of the constitution and within the operation of sound economic law."

During a greater part of today's session of the convention there was no business transacted because there was none at hand.

Farm Relief Is Bugbear
It was evident that a bitter contest on the floor was in prospect over the farm relief question when the resolutions committee report finally is submitted with the equalization fee plan, distasteful to the administration and demanded by opposing groups as the big issue.

There also were forebodings visible of a hot contest over the prohibition plank which has been drawn at the insistence of Senator Borah of Idaho who has contended that the party must place itself on record unequivocally on the sanctity and enforcement of the constitution.

Nicholas Murray Butler of New York, on arriving at the hall today, said the prohibition fight would be taken to the floor of the convention if a plank was offered which centered on the 18th amendment alone for law enforcement.

The next business on the convention roster is the platform. It appeared probable that the nominations for the vice presidency and the customary floor demonstrations for candidates would get the right of way next, barring an unexpected break in the resolutions committee deadlock.

NEW YORK IN BAND WAGON

Delegation to Cast Its 90 Votes for Secretary Hoover

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 13.—(AP)—The stampede to Hoover assumed huge proportions tonight when the New York delegation decided to cast its 90 votes for him on the first ballot, to swell the already decisive margin which he received when the Pennsylvanians decided to join his forces.

Just before the convention met in its first night session, the New York delegation held a caucus which voted overwhelmingly in favor of the commerce secretary's candidacy but the accretions were not needed to make the Hoover caucus a winning one.

The purpose of the night session was to receive the platform but before the delegates began coming in it was evident that the fight over the farm relief plank in the resolutions committee would make it impossible to submit that document before tomorrow.

winning margin in the presidential contest. First the leaders adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning and his motion was carried with a whoop from the handful of delegates present at exactly 7:27 p. m., central standard time. The session lasted, officially about one minute.

Dawes Willing to Run
As for Vice-President Daves the opinion prevails that he will accept the nomination if tendered to him again.

There seems to be considerable doubt as to whether Senator Curtis, a presidential candidate, would accept the vice-presidency. Until he is definitely in of the race, Mr. Curtis is not going to discuss it, but he has used pretty strong

words in discussing those who are proposing him for second place while the head of the ticket is still to be chosen.

Moses to Oppose Daves
KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 13.—(AP)—Vice-presidential politics warmed up tonight as the Republican convention waited for its platform and Senator Moses, of New Hampshire was put forward in the latest boom as an opponent of Vice-President Daves who still seemed to be holding the advantage in the preliminary discussion.

Senator Reed of Pennsylvania proposed Moses and there seemed to be a crystallization of sentiment among easterners behind the New Hampshire senator who brought the convention to its feet today with a ripping attack on the Democrats in his speech accepting the permanent chairmanship. Vermont declared for him today.

Indications have been that Mr. Daves would accept the nomination if he were "drafted," but he would not make a contest for the nomination.

proved he would carry the wet and dry fight to the floor of the convention after the platform had been submitted.

Farm Forces Make Demands
A similar threat was made by proponents of a plank endorsing the principles of the McNary-Haugen bill if their views should not be met by the resolutions committee. The farm forces in the platform making body were augmented late in the day by Senator Norbeck of South Dakota, who stated that he was prepared for a long finish fight.

Prediction that the fight over the relief plank would be transferred from the resolutions committee was made late in the day by Senator Borah.

Borah declared that the differ-

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ences of opinion "ought to be settled in open convention in the face of the world."

"It has now come to a test of loyalty to agriculture of whether one is for the equalization fee or against it," he said. "I accept the farmers' plank if they will strike out the provision for the equalization fee."

Members of the committee said the sub-committee draft made by the sub-committee has been approved down to the agricultural plank. This still left to come the

fight over the prohibition enforcement declaration.

FREE PROVISION IS DELETED
Party Platform Is Completed in Stormy Night Session

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 13.—(AP)—The Republican convention platform committee tonight voted against any mention of the equalization fee in the farm relief plank, accepting the tentative draft of the plank that had been proposed by the sub-committee of 15. The

committee also approved the Borah plank declaring for specific enforcement of the eighteenth amendment.

This practically cleared up all the points in dispute and indicated that the committee probably would adjourn shortly.

It is expected that the fight over the farm relief plank will be renewed when the platform formally is submitted on the convention floor tomorrow. Farm leaders have declared that the fight for the equalization fee principle was one to the finish and that they

would not give up until course for its adoption was employed.

The farm relief plank, approved by the resolutions committee, takes the agricultural industry to surprise crops marketing of the same.

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
