

REPUBLICAN PARTY TO REST ON DEEDS TO WIN

Words Not to Figure in Laying Case Before Voter

NOMINEES NOT ORATORS

Hoover Does Not Care For Stumping and He Will Be More of "Porch" Campaign

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 15.—(AP)—With its campaign destined ever so quietly to be a "porch" campaign, the Republican party will enter the battle of 1934, planning largely to rest on deeds, not words. In laying its case before the American voter, such is the interpretation placed on the selection today of Curtis of Kansas as the running mate of Herbert Hoover. Neither man is credited with extraordinary powers of oratory, or platform magnetism which could be relied on to bring out votes needed in doubtful states.

Hoover "Porch" Campaign
So far as Mr. Hoover is concerned, it is likely to be a pretty much of a "porch" campaign. He does not care much for stumping, and the bulk of platform campaigning undoubtedly will fall on Curtis. Both and particularly Hoover, are expected to make extensive use of the radio, which, in recent years, has revolutionized political campaign methods.

The lines on which the Republicans will conduct their fight this year will not be determined until after Hoover and Curtis have had opportunity to map out strategy with party leaders, a campaign director has been chosen and the Democrats at Houston have named their ticket.

It is certain, however, that the Republican presidential nominee after a series of conferences in Washington with party leaders, will journey across the continent early next month, to St. Paul, Minn., California, home. There he formally will be notified of his nomination by Senator Moses of New Hampshire, and this occasion will afford him an opportunity to discuss the issues of the campaign as he sees them.

Curtis Notified at Toledo
The notification of Curtis will take place at Toledo, his home town, with Senator Fess, of Ohio, at the head of the official committee.

It is Mr. Hoover's present intention to spend a month or more in the west, campaigning but little and then to return to the east or some point in the middle west to establish his base for the remainder of the campaign. If main headquarters of the Republicans are established in Chicago, as some leaders are urging, it is not improbable that he might operate from some country estate near that city, delivering only a limited number of campaign speeches at strategic points. As for Curtis, although he rarely makes an extended speech in the senate, he is known as a vigorous campaigner on the stump in his home state of Kansas. He makes an old fashioned political speech, frequently bluntly worded, and seems to enjoy pounding home arguments to a crowd.

COOLIDGE GOES FISHING

ASKS FOR WORMS AND TRIES HIS LUCK IN LAKE

SUPERIOR, Wis., June 15.—(AP)—President Coolidge went fishing today but the result was as mysterious as the day, which tonight encompassed Cedar Island Lodge.

Within a few hours after the president had arrived at the camp on the Beaver river, he was seen out on the bridge leading to the mainland from the lodge. He was carrying a fishing pole, and a short time later, it was said, he asked for worms and went over to Lake Nebagamon, six miles away, to try his luck.

No information as to his catch, if any, was given out.

A few years lived the life of a normal American boy. But Curtis is a restless and energetic nature. He wished to earn his living. He began to sell refreshments as a news butcher at the railroad station after school hours and did odd jobs for anybody who would employ him.

His keen knowledge of horses, learned on the plains, attracted the attention of a racehorse man, who employed him as a jockey. Curtis took to this job with glee and during his several years campaigning with horses up and down the western circuit, he shot more winners across than any other jockey.

So Charles, after finishing school became the office boy and janitor-law student of the firm of A. H. Case. He swept the floor and ran errands but soon found that he needed funds or else must depend on relatives and friends for support.

Drove Back on Streets
He contracted with a livery man to drive a hack on the streets of Topeka at night and sell the profits. He became so popular that he made more money than did the regular drivers.

He finished his law course and was admitted to the bar in 1881 and became Case's partner. In 1884, at the age of 24 he was elected prosecuting attorney for Shawnee county.

FLOOD RAGES IN SOUTH

LEEVE ON WHITE RIVER IS BROKEN, REPORT SAYS

At Least 200 Families in Path of Water Are Fleeing to Higher Ground

NEWPORT, Ark., June 15.—(AP)—The Stephens levee, on the White river, ten miles south of here, broke early tonight, allowing flood waters from the swollen stream to sweep over a large area.

At least 200 families, in the path of the water, were fleeing to higher ground, and it was believed that all would reach safety. Several hundred families moved from the affected area in the last few days. Four towns were in the path of the water, Tupelo, Auverne, Shoffner and Weldon.

An hour after the levee broke engineers cut another levee a mile from the first to release "still" water which they hoped would serve to check the sweep of water from Stephens break.

The water was rushing to the Cache river, tonight and three of the four villages were reported in danger of inundation. The water will force the Cache river to back up to near Cotton Plant, engineers said. About 200 men were on the levee when it broke. Most of the equipment was abandoned and swept away.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., June 15.—(AP)—Reports received here tonight by the Mississippi river commission indicated the situation along the flooding St. Francis river was becoming more acute. Two sections of the levee protecting the eastern bank of the St. Francis above Kennett, Missouri, are in grave danger. Associate Engineer Blair A. Ross reported.
