CONVENTION FILMS HERE

PICTURES OF REPUBLICAN

GATHERING AT McDONALD
 Negatives Rushed to Coast by Plane
 and Developed While
 En Route

A particularly interesting scoop
 is announced by the McDonald in
 securing the first motion pictures
 of the national Republican con-
 vention in session at Kansas City,
 which will be shown in full detail
 as a special feature of the regular
 picture program headed by Rich-
 ard Dix in "Easy Come, Easy Go,"
 at that theatre today.

The films, which were taken ex-
 clusively by the International news
 camera man, were rushed from the
 convention hall and the negatives,
 still in the cameras, were placed in
 a specially constructed plane,
 which soared westward. Aboard the
 plane, photographers developed and
 printed the films, and when the
 ship came down at its destina-
 tion, in Portland, the completed
 film, ready to be shown, was wait-
 ing for the eager messengers who
 were to dispatch them to the Port-
 land theatre, and the McDonald in
 Eugene. The films were motorcy-
 cled here in an effort to get them
 on the screen last night, but the
 rider did not arrive until after the
 show, encountering a slight mishap
 just outside of Oregon City.

The films have arrived, however,
 and will be flashed on the McDona-
 ld screen for the first time this
 afternoon, just two days after they
 were taken in Kansas City, where
 Herbert Hoover was selected as
 Republican candidate for the presi-
 dency. The pictures will be shown
 at every performance at the Mc-
 Donald this afternoon and even-
 ing.
