

HOOVER MIXES DUTIES WITH HIS NEW STATUS

Surveys Site of Department Building to Rise

CONFERS WITH McNARY

Also Finds Time to Acknowledge the Thousands of Messages of Congratulation

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16. —(AP)—Secretary Hoover mixed in considerable attention to his official duties today in the course of dealing with matters that have to do with his new status of the Republican presidential candidate.

While his earliest caller was Senator McNary, Republican, Oregon, leader of the fight of agricultural interests for the equalization of farm relief, an hour later found Mr. Hoover surveying the excavations for the new commerce department building in Washington. He went over the site of the structure with his architectural assistant and lunch later with Secretary Kellogg of the state department.

Nominee in Sympathy
After his conference with Mr. Hoover, Senator McNary issued a statement in which he declared that the nominee had been "sympathetic and anxious to relieve the distress of our farm population."

The prolonged luncheon engagement with the secretary of state was said to have brought out discussions purely of departmental matters, many of the commerce department bureaus having a great deal of foreign service and functioning under joint supervision of the two secretaries.

Despite his attention to his regular official duties Mr. Hoover, however, was able to find time to acknowledge many of the thousands of messages of congratulation which are still coming in by cable, telegram and mail.

May Resign Cabinet Post

A number of questions which are before Secretary Hoover include, the advisability of his resignation from his cabinet post and the time of his withdrawal; his summer plan and whether he should go immediately to his California home; the selection of a national committee chairman and the form of his campaign organization.

He has already received a dozen invitations from individuals and communities, chiefly from the middle-western states of Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota and Michigan, offering him quarters and facilities for the establishment of a summer base. All these invitations, however, were held over, awaiting the determination of his plans.

Annual Celebration of the Oregon League of Central Society Will be Observed

SALEM, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—Frank Safford of Salem was elected president of the Oregon League of Catholic Central society here today. Other officers named included A. J. J. of Portland, vice-president; August Moorman, Salem, recording secretary; John Meyer, Salem, financial secretary; Andrew Weber, Salem, treasurer; Rev. F. H. Scherbing, Silverton, commissarius; Rev. Thomas V. Keenan of Salem was elected delegate to the national convention.

SALEM, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—No less than five thousand Catholic visitors and probably 10,000, are expected in Salem tomorrow for the annual celebration of the Oregon league of the Catholic Central society, a branch of the Catholic Central Verein of America.

This was preceded today by the annual business meeting of the Catholic Central society. The meetings are being held at the state fair grounds.

Pontifical high mass will be celebrated tomorrow in the automobile pavilion at the fair grounds by Archbishop Edward D. Howard of the diocese of Portland, with sermon by J. R. Buck of Salem.

It is said that not until this year have clergy and laity co-operated for a discussion of the principles of civic virtue and social reform.

A dinner will be served at noon, and in the afternoon there will be athletics and a program of speeches and music. Governor Patterson will be represented by his former secretary, Hal E. Hoar, Republican candidate for secretary of state.

GENE TUNNEY SLOW AND HIS TIMING VERY POOR

Makes Miserable Showing in Workout with Vidabek

SPECULATOR, N. Y., June 16.—(14)—One panel of the canvas that has shrouded Gene Tunney from the eyes of the curious while he prepared for his heavyweight title defense against Tom Heeney at New York July 28, was lifted today and spectators had the opportunity of watching a champion miss a lot of punches.

Tunney's general physical condition appeared to be very good, but in the three rounds he missed punches with Billy Vidabek, a light heavyweight sparring partner, his timing was off and his footwork slow. It appeared, however, that Tunney was punching harder than he ever has. This observation was confirmed by Vidabek who has been training with Tunney for three years.

Tunney also boxed two rounds with Charlie Rosen, a welterweight, in an attempt to work up some speed. Experts generally conceded that the champion needed plenty of that kind of training.

A large crowd gathered to see the first public workout. The remainder of his workouts will be open to the public.

Exaggerated Action of Left Foot Will Ruin a Shot

Too much action on the part of the left foot and too little pivoting are faults that prevent many golfers from scoring the way they ought to score and just a few words of advice on those two points may be helpful.

Abe Mitchell, the English star, has frequently been pointed out as an example of perfect economy of foot action. Abe keeps the ball on the left foot firmly on the ground. His left heel comes up slightly, but not to any marked degree. With him there is only a slight bend of the instep as the heel is raised, rather than any turn of the foot, and that another age is, in my opinion, part of the reason why he is so consistently

FLYING CLOUD OVER 20 MILES AHEAD IN BUNION

Second Indian Runner, Old Zuni, Willets Entry

LATYONVILLE, Cal., June 16.—(AP)—Flirly entrenched in first position, Flying Cloud, Karok Indian, left this town behind shortly after two o'clock this afternoon as he headed for the coast in the San Francisco to Grants Pass Indian marathon. He was more than 20 miles ahead of the next runner, Melika, the 55-year-old Zuni representing Willets, Cal. Flying Cloud, sponsored by the Oregon Cavesmen of Grants Pass and winner of second place last year, was in good condition and his trainer said he would run well into the night. He arrived in Latyonville, 167 miles from Grants Pass, actual starting point at 1:44 p. m. and left at 2:03 p. m.

Positions of others in the first ranks continued to change owing to stops for rest and medical treatment.

Mad Bull, last year's winner and one of the present favorites, was reported to be resting along the 24 mile stretch between Ukiah and Willets. He has been handicapped by chafing and illness.

Mad Bull is from the same tribe as Flying Cloud and sponsored by the same organization.

TWO RECORDS SET IN OLYMPIC RACE TRIALS

Lloyd Hahn Breaks Mark in the 200-Meter Run

NEW YORK, June 16.—(AP)—Two record-smashing performances—a new American mark by Lloyd Hahn, the Boston express, in the 200-meter run, and a world's record by Johnny Gibson, Bloomfield, N. J., star, in the 400-meter low hurdles—furnished the principal thrills today in the eastern Olympic track and field tryouts.

Hahn, running his first outdoor race in big league competition in two years, demonstrated he has lost none of the edge of his remarkable indoor form of last winter by galloping home in front of a crack 400-meter field in one minute 52.1-5 seconds. The transplanted Nebraska flier, setting his own pace after working his way quickly out in front, knocked off one and three-tenths seconds off the American record of 1:53.5-10 set four years ago by Larry Brown and beat his nearest rival, Sam Martin, of the A. A. U., by six yards. Hahn's time was only three-fifths of a second short of equalling the world's outdoor record held by the German doctor, Otto Pelzer.

Gibson romped to record his brilliant performance to the cheers of a crowd of 15,000 in the big ball park when Gibson romped to a world's record of 53.2-5 seconds for the 100-meter low hurdles—outclassing most of his rivals and beating Russell (Whitey) Lloyd,

long and straight with all his shots.

It is seldom that a professional has to pay any heed to his footwork, for the pivot if properly made will automatically take care of that. The initial movement in the swing is, or should be, the turn of the left knee and the turn of the left shoulder. Starting them together will result in greater smoothness of the swing and as they start to turn the left heel is bound to come up, lifted by the turn of the knee.

This turning of the body is absolutely essential because it relaxes the left side. The left shoulder should be permitted to come around to a place where, at the top of the swing, you are looking at the ball over the point of the shoulder. It is not polite, however, to waste any time thinking about what the left heel is doing. If the turn of the knee is properly made then the action of the foot will be automatic.

The big mistake made by golfers is that they do not turn the knee and the shoulder enough, with the result that both the feet are usually flat on the ground, heel and toe alike. If this happens it is impossible to relax and to transfer the weight, or most of it to the right leg and foot. Be careful to get the left knee and the left shoulder turning together. Unless they do it is impossible to keep up the rhythm of the swing and as I have said before rhythm is the basis of good golf.

The average player, as I have found, it afraid to let the left knee

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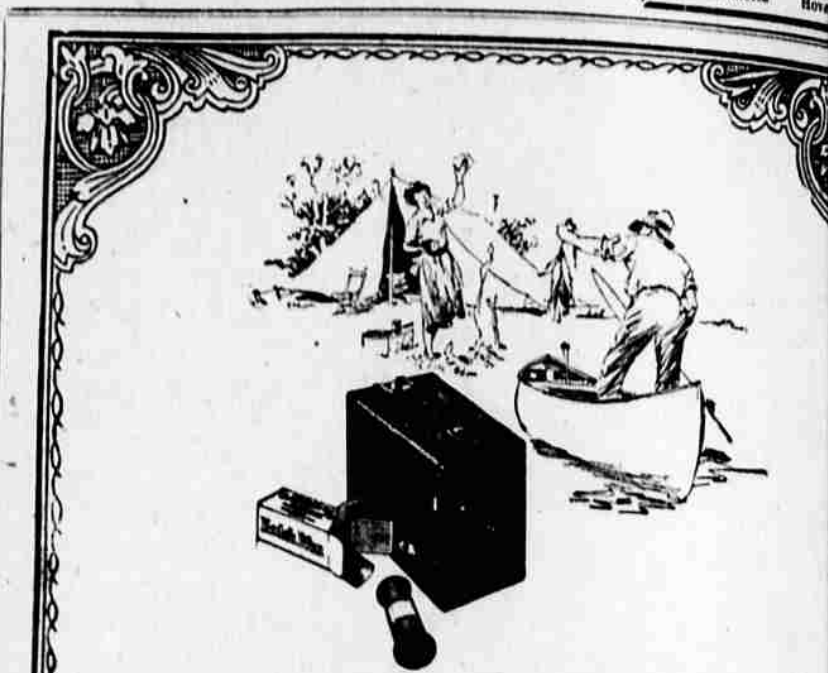
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and the left shoulder turn in smoothly. This is shown by a glance at the way the majority of players keep the left foot either flat on the ground, which means that they are completely tied up before they swing, or else they get up on the toe like a toe-dancer and have no purchase whatsoever. Either way is disastrous; the right way is the one that gives you a feeling of pushing on the ground with the inside of the ball of the foot, when at the top of the swing.
