

MOHAMMEDANS START PILGRIMAGE TO MECCA

Moslems on Annual Trek Over Burning Sands

LADEN CAMELS ON TRAIL

Faithful to Slay Sacrificial Lambs at Arafat and Stone Devils at Mina

JEDDAH, Arabia. (AP)—Eighty thousand Mohammedan pilgrims have started the annual trek over the burning sands of Arabia to Mecca.

In a month's time a quarter million Moslems will be assembled from north and south, east and west, Bokhara and Zanzibar, Java and Morocco, for the culminating acts of the great ritual of the annual pilgrimage, the slaying of the sacrificial lambs at Arafat and the stoning of the devils at Mina.

And when all this has been accomplished a quarter million Moslems, less those who succumbed to the hardships of the journey on the way to the holy city of Mecca, will return whence they came, qualified in proud and pious memorial of their endurance and faith, to wear forever the green turban of the full-blown Hajj.

Holy Carpet Absent
The only thing lacking this year in the absence of the holy carpet, which is not making its usual yearly journey from Egypt to Mecca. The ceremony of the Hajj with its military trappings, its band and its gaily caparisoned camels, is followed by time and custom, but music offends the Wahabi sect of the Moslems which now dominates the holy place of Mohammed and foreign military escorts insult their conceptions of national independence. Rather than cause renewed bickering between Egypt and the Hedjaz, the carpet has been left at home.

For three months crowded pilgrim ships have arrived weekly at Jeddah. Jeddah harbor is reef-bound and disembarkation has to be by sambuks. The majority of the pilgrims are already bareheaded and wearing the prescribed dress, two lengths of new seamless white calico worn haphazard as shawl and skirt.

Once ashore the different parties are quickly taken in charge by local guides who shepherd them in wide-eyed silent processions through the maze of streets to official lodging houses.

No Tarrying at Jeddah
Jeddah is the bottle neck of the Haj, and the authorities do not encourage the pilgrims to tarry on their road to Mecca. By dawn the twin-coupled palanquins have been mustered in orderly rows in convenient squares near the lodging houses. As soon as it is light, camels in strings of four and five begin to arrive and the long process of loading begins. Four wiry camelmenn lightly swing a palanquin across the hump of a startled camel. He heaves and lurches to his feet, his indignant and, to the two pilgrims whose 40-mile journey is to be made on his back, a fearsome beast.

But up they go, the ship of the desert finds an even keel, and with the stealthy tread of pad on sand, the camels swing off to the outskirts of the town.

At last the assembly is achieved. The mutawif mounts a sturdy white jackass, checks his charges and their baggage and the long procession moves off through the town, through the narrow Mecca Gate, and out at last on a wide sandy road, stretching away over yellow foothills to a jagged range of blue mountains, behind which, in a sunbaked ravine, lies Mecca itself.

FLYING CLOUD OUT AHEAD

KAROOK INDIAN LEADS MELIKAS BY A FEW MILES

EUREKA, Cal., June 18.—(AP)—With a roaring send-off by several thousand persons, Flying Cloud, leader in the San Francisco to Grants Pass, Ore., Indian marathon, pulled out of this city at 5:15 o'clock this afternoon. He arrived here at 10:21 a. m. today.

When he left, the Karook tribesman was a few miles ahead of Melika, 55-year-old Zuni, representing Willits, Cal. Melika stopped to rest 12 miles south of Eureka at 4 o'clock. Flying Cloud was greatly refreshed by the long stopover in Eureka.

Other runners were scattered over the Redwood highway. Mad Bull, last year's winner, and favorite at the start this year, was 69 miles behind the leader this afternoon.

their long flight from Treaspass Bay was taken after a former decision to fly on to Southampton had been abandoned. They were just too tired for the ordeal of further flying. They should set out tomorrow at about 10 o'clock for that city.

At the hotel today Barry Port's police had to take the most elaborate precautions to prevent harm to Miss Earhart from her too ardent Welsh admirers. She was the darling of them all, was this fair-haired willowy Boston girl with the face and demeanor of a Lindbergh.

Cloud Banks Obscure Vision
During the greater part of the trip across the Atlantic it was well nigh impossible to see anything at all on account of the heavy cloud-banks and the driving rain. Stultz said in describing the flight. They kept in touch with the outside world by means of the radio and the occasional greetings from passing ships.

"We were quite cheerful," he added. "Our only anxiety was that our fuel would not last. It was beginning to run low when finally we sighted land."

The newspapers in their special editions cite that three women have already lost their lives in attempting the Atlantic hazard, and another, Ruth Elder, was only able to go part way and had to be rescued before disaster overtook her, too.

NATIONAL BANKS UPHELD

JUDGE BEAN IN RULING DENIES TAX IMPOSTS

Cannot Levy Upon Their Shares While Competing Money Capital Is Not Equally Taxed

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18. (AP)—Declaring that evidencefully sustained the contention of seven national banks of Portland, that the attempt of the state to impose a tax upon their shares while competing money capital was not equally taxed, was unlawful, Federal Judge Bean today handed down a decision in favor of the plaintiff banks, permanently restraining T. M. Hurlburt, sheriff and tax collector of Multnomah county, from collecting the tax assessed for 1924.

In his opinion, Judge Bean said: "The applicable law has been clearly established. National banks are agencies of the general government and neither their property nor their shares of stock can be taxed by the state without the consent of congress, and then only in conformity to such restrictions as it may impose."

Quota Act of Congress
"Congress by appropriate legislation has permitted the taxation by the states of shares of national banks, subject to the restrictions that the tax imposed shall not be at a greater rate than is assessed upon other moneyed capital in the hands of individual citizens of such state coming into competition with the business of national banks."

The decision of the court is effective to invalidate the assessment for 1927, now due, as well as that for 1924, and any further assessment against the banks by the state until the present taxation law is changed.

A particularly significant feature of the court's holding was the recognition of thirty-four million dollars worth of highway bonds, held by individual residents of the state, as being in active competition with the capital of the bank.

WOMEN KILLED IN CRASH

MRS. L. S. ROACH AND MOTHER, MRS. KOCH, VICTIMS

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 18. (AP)—Mrs. L. S. Roach of Kalama, vice-president of the Cowalla county anti-tuberculosis league was killed today and her mother, Mrs. Josephine Koch, received injuries from which she died, when their automobile crashed into another driven by Louis Harnes of Grand Junction, Colo. The accident occurred on the Pacific highway near the northern city limits of Vancouver. The Roach car was turned over three times and finally landed right side up, 25 feet off the highway and 50 feet from the point of collision.

At an inquest today the accident was declared unavoidable.

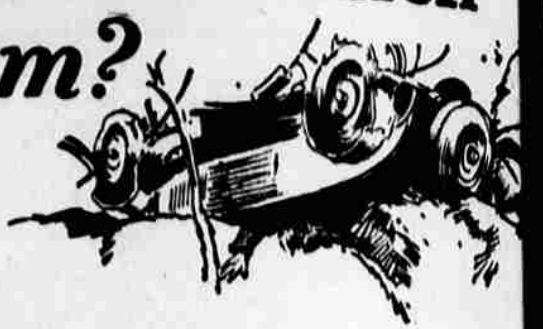
