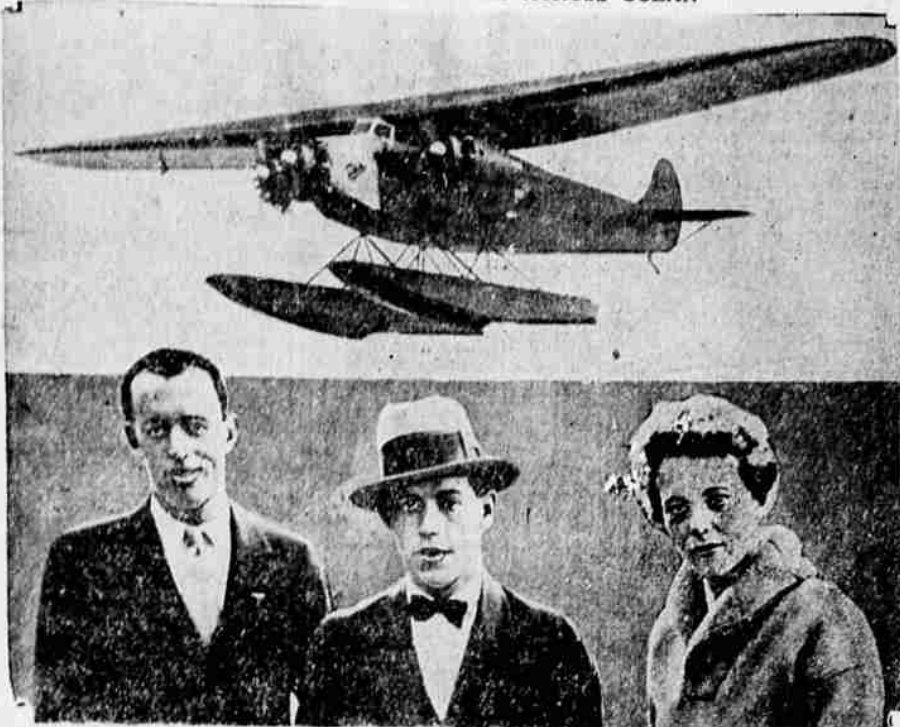


MISS AMELI EARHART FLIES ACROSS OCEAN

CHECK CHARGE IS MADE

Ferguson is alleged to have written a number of checks here on the Bank of Commerce, signing the name Ferguson on all of them. When he wrote one for the Cosmo cigar store for \$2, W. J. Scott, proprietor, called the police. Ferguson is said to have claimed that he had \$700 in the Ladd and Bush bank in Salem, but the officers found on checking with Salem police that he never had an account there, but that a large number of checks had been written on the bank. The man has been here several days and was negotiating for the purchase of a local barber shop, it was said.

SCHOOL COSTS LISTED

\$103 SPENT ON EACH HIGH STUDENT DURING YEAR

O. H. Jones Compiles Report for County Superintendent; All Over 8th Grade Included

The Eugene school district spent \$103.39 in educating each child enrolled in high school grades during the past school year, according to a report compiled by O. H. Jones, district clerk. The report will be turned over to E. J. Moore, county superintendent.

Last year, Mr. Jones said, the cost for each pupil was slightly less than \$100, but the gain this year is due mostly to the fact that interest on money invested for high school purposes was included in the cost.

The total number of high school pupils enrolled during the year was 1161, the report shows, and the average daily attendance was 1116.6. Thirty-nine full time teachers, 38 part time teachers were employed. Salaries paid high school teachers totaled \$31,394.53 and the total cost of maintaining high school instruction for the year was \$115,796.60.

The figures include the senior high school, ninth grade pupils in the two junior high schools and all pupils above the eighth grade in University high school.

MRS. RUTH KENYON DIES

RESIDENT OF LANE COUNTY WAS AGED 23 YEARS

Mrs. Ruth Kenyon, wife of B. R. Kenyon, employee of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, died at the Eugene hospital Sunday after a long illness. She was only 23 years of age. Mrs. Kenyon was born at Merrill, Oregon, and was married in 1922.

Survivors include her husband, her mother, Mrs. Eugene Miller, two brothers and two sisters. Funeral services will be held at 10:30 o'clock this morning at the Albany cemetery. Veatch funeral home is in charge of arrangements.
