

MANAGER IS NOT WHOLE SHOW

Managerial Skill is One Thing but Making Champions Out of Rough Material is Something Different

Picking up a blow out of nowhere and tossing him to championship heights isn't a simple matter—as Jack Kearns now undoubtedly is testifying.

Managerial skill in the fight racket is one thing but making champions out of rough material is something radically different.

Back in 1919 when Jack Dempsey bowed over the modern "David," Jess Willard, some folks overlooked the rather pertinent fact that Dempsey did it. There was much huzzling about "Kearns did it; he's the miracle man."

Kearns thought, too. He undoubtedly thought that all the younger needed to become champion was to be manager and touched by the magic wand of Kearns.

To insure himself against failure Kearns refused to take charge of the affairs of novices or dubs. He picked only the men who had ability and a reputation and who looked as if they couldn't make Kearns going to take any more chances against demonstrating his miraculous powers than was absolutely necessary.

Among the first of his porteges was Marty Farrell, then a great welterweight. Kearns took him and touched him and then retouched him. But it didn't do any good.

Farrell never became a champion, nor a near champion and soon faded out of the "big time" picture.

Then there was a youth whose real name was Hyman Gold, but whose ring moniker was Oakland Jimmy Duffy. Kearns harpooned him, shipped him to New York, polished him up a la Kearns and sent him to the brass.

Somebody knocked out Hyman so fast the ringriders thought the first bell had jarred the roof off his head.

And that a collapsing beam had wrecked Hyman's title status. Later Kearns tried out Hyman, figuring the first time was an accident. But the Kearns-managed Hyman again was a loser.

Kearns turned Hyman adrift not so long afterwards, and then Hyman, for no reason at all, got along very well and regained quite a bit of his lost prestige.

Kearns was manager of Baby Joe Gans. But it didn't do the negro much good. When Kearns "freed" him the dusky youth revived, like a dew-drenched posie and since then he's been quite a little Joe-banana.

Joe Benjamin was doing quite well for himself but he wasn't a champion among the lightweights. Kearns took note of that fact and told Joe that it was all because he wasn't being managed, or whatever it was, that Kearns said characterized his managerial methods.

So Joe said: "Okay, you manage me." Kearns did, he cast his magic spell over Joe—and the result was as usual. Joe just skidded and skidded, never became champion and long ago ceased being a fist swinger.

Kearns had Ernie Owens—and Ernie failed, under his management. He had Napoleon Dorrval and Dorrval got nowhere while Kearns had him. The same was true concerning Bill Gothe and Matty Mario.

All of which isn't a smack upon the dainty wrist of Jack Kearns—unless he feverishly desires to receive it as such. It's primarily an effort to establish the fact that champions are born not made and that if a fighter hasn't all the natural requisites, the genius of all the managers in the world can't make him king of sociology.
