He fetches stone from a quarry, wheels a barrow, and does other muscular jobs, keeping the same

hours and observing the same conditions as the other workmen employed on the building.

The duke, who is 56, is the titular head of the great clan Campbell and a nephew of the Princess Louise, daughter of Queen Victoria.
