A great message was given Portland's business world at the Members' Forum of the Portland chamber of commerce yesterday.

It was the story of flax production and manufacture, told by experts. Here is a sample statement: Mr. Brittain in the St. Paul district, Marion county, had a yield of flax last year when, when sold, returned him \$110 net profit per acre.

It was also shown that, contrary to the old idea of farmers, the growing of flax crops helps instead of depleting the soil fertility.

The case of one Marion county farmer was cited who followed a crop of flax with a crop of wheat and got a wheat yield of 40 bushels per acre, the largest crop eight inches taller than the rest of the area.
