WOMEN ASK TO ENTER CLASS IN HOOP COACHING

Course Not Taught in Oregon Session This Summer

The lure of athletic coaching has caught the fancy of women, according to Virgil D. Earl, director of athletics at the University of Oregon, who yesterday had four women teachers ask to sign up for the special basketball and baseball coaching courses to be taught in the summer session by William J. Reinhart, head Oregon mentor in these sports.

Whether or not it was Reinhart's "Greek profile" or his ability as a winning coach that attracted the fair sex was not known by Earl. But anyway four women, teachers of grade and junior high schools of the state, asked Earl if they could take the coaching courses. Reinhart, somewhat stunned by the desire of the women, could not take them into his classes. He failed to make arrangements in his course so that women could be instructed. So the four women will not be members of these classes. However, Earl has now come to realize that a course in athletic coaching for women soon will become a necessary part of the annual summer coaching school. He pointed out that several smaller grade schools and junior high schools could not afford an athletic coach or director who was able properly to handle the young boys, and that to overcome this it would be necessary for women teachers to learn something of the games. Women would be as capable as men in coaching the young boys if offered instruction in coaching and training methods, each he believes.

Although Earl asked Dr. Dan E. Clark, head of the summer school, if it was possible to add a special coaching course for women, the request came too late. However, it wouldn't be surprising if such courses were added to the summer school for 1923.

EUGENE BOY ASSURED OF TRIP TO TRYOUTS

DeMers' Fund Drive Nearly Over Top, Is Report
MAY GO TO OLYMPICS

If Lad Makes Good in Boston, He Will Compete in Holland; Hurler Javelin Far

Jimmy DeMers, Eugene high school graduate of this year, is assured of a chance to try out for the United States Olympic team at Boston. DeMers has broken the world's record for the javelin throw several times in practice. The drive to raise \$600 to send the boy to Boston is practically over the top. R. S. Bryson, chairman of a service club committee in charge of the drive, said last night. A few subscriptions are yet to come in and a few details to check up, but Mr. Bryson and other members believe that when this is done, the sum will have been raised. DeMers will probably leave for Boston Friday. If he makes good at the national tryouts, he will go to Amsterdam, Holland, to compete in the Olympic contests with the best athletes from all countries of the world. He is believed to have a good chance of winning the javelin event.

Javelin Hurler Far
 DeMers threw the javelin 215 feet 2 inches against a heavy wind in an exhibition at Hayward field on the University of Oregon campus yesterday afternoon. The distance was carefully measured by Bill Hayward, university track mentor. The boy's longest unofficial throw is 225 feet, which is considerably better than the world's record of 218 feet 6 inches. He holds an official record of 213 feet 6 inches. DeMers won the national interscholastic record for the javelin in Chicago last year.

OREGON TRACK CAPTAIN FINISHES HALF EVENTS

Victor Wetzel, University of Oregon candidate for the United States Olympic track and field

Wetzel finished his half of the events yesterday successfully. He completed the first half of his tryouts held on Hayward field. This afternoon he will undertake the remainder of the 10 events necessary in the decathlon. Trials probably will start at 2 o'clock. The Oregon cinder captain is forced to score at least 7000 points in the 10 individual events to qualify for the final Olympic tryouts to be held in Philadelphia July 3 and 4. The Philadelphia tryouts are final for the Olympic team, according to William Hayward, famous Webfoot track coach and recently named trainer on the United States Olympic team. Candidates for the decathlon, none of whom are Oregonians, will compete at Philadelphia and the leading five will be chosen to go to Amsterdam. Other track and field men will enter the finals to be held at Boston July 5, 6 and 7. Wetzel scored 3456 points in the five events entered yesterday. This was accomplished by the following times and distances: 100-meter dash in 1:11 flat; broad jump at 19 feet; discus at 123 feet 8 inches; high jump at 5 feet 4 inches; 400-meter run in 1:55.6. The 100-meter dash, a distance of 23 feet over the 100-yard dash mark, was the best performance turned in. Paced by Ruben Rosa, Webfoot star dash man and 440-yard runner, Wetzel finished in the exceptional time of 1:11 flat. This gave him a score of 904.50 to start the afternoon's performance. But because of threatening weather and a strong wind which blew cold down the field, Wetzel failed to come up to previous performances in the jumps and weight events. His distance of 19 feet in the broad jump is two feet less than his usual practice jump. Also he has registered near the 5 foot 8 inch mark in the high jump. This last week he tossed the discus better than 130 feet in practice. However, his performance, even against the cold weather, was exceptional, Hayward stated, and the Oregon star looks as a strong contender for Olympic honors. The total score of 3456.56 points gives him a margin slightly over 148 points to work on today. Four events will be on the program this afternoon in the tryouts. These include the javelin, pole vault, 150-meter run and 110-meter high hurdles. Because of an injured wrist Wetzel will not attempt to put the 16-pound shot.
