COUNCIL DOES BUSINESS

COTTAGE GROVE CITY DADS
HEAR PETITIONSCity Will Not Install Its Own
Lights as Present Franchise
Runs To 1935(Register Lane County Special)
COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., June 21.—Several important petitions were asked for and granted at adjourned meeting of the city council Monday night.

Gidney and Saffley asked to redress the roof of their building at the corner of Seventh and Washington streets with fire-proof asbestos paint and the petition was granted.

A petition by J. H. Bartels to install an eight-horse power boiler and flue in the rear of the Bartels building, 616 Main street, was allowed on condition that he comply with the fire regulations.

Petition by W. L. Hubbel and Frank Sly to remodel their store building, corner Fifth and Main streets, was granted subject to fire regulations. Councilman Durham reported the petition of W. J. Craig to have sidewalks extended from his place to Third street. Further time was asked in this matter and was granted.

The light committee reported that as the present franchise held to 1935, that the city abandon the matter of installing its lights at the present. The recommendation was adopted.

A street light was ordered placed at the south end of Third street near the Pluard residence. S. L. Godard was heard with respect to the changes being anticipated at the Emblem service station located at the corner of Main and Ninth streets. The matter was passed subject to fire regulations.

Subject of a lane through the W. J. White property was brought up again and Mr. White's proposition to the city was accepted, covered by certain regulations.

Recorder was authorized to sign all warrants for quit claim deeds or leaves on the new pipe line extension.

Council adjourned to meet June 28.

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BRIDGE PLANS CHANGED

90 FEET TO BE ADDED ONTO
WILLAMETTE SPANHighway Commission Orders Pier
Added To Do Away With
Slough Fill

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., June 21.—Ninety feet will be added to the original plans of the new McKenzie highway bridge now in construction across the Willamette river here, it has been announced by the contractors. This change was made after a protest by the county court at the state highway commission meeting and an investigation by the commission.

The original plans called for a large fill across the slough on the east side of the river. One of the objections to filling this is that it would take away a large part of the waterway in time of flood. Also, the Springfield sewer empties into it.

Under the new plan an additional pier will have to be added to the four already forming the foundation for the bridge. Cement work on the bridge is progressing rapidly and the steel work will start within a few weeks.
