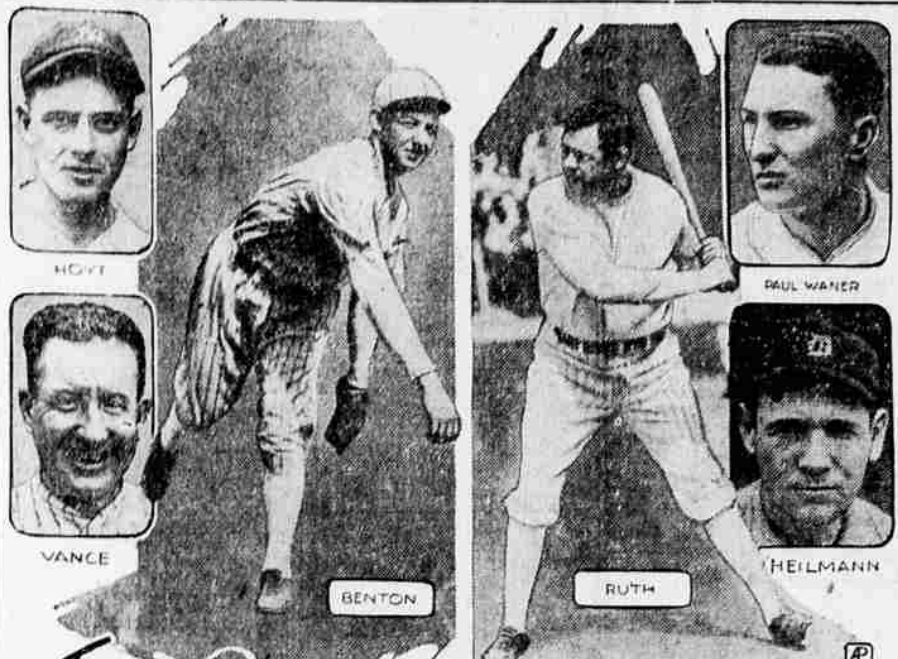

Galaxy of Eager Athletes Topped Them All in 1927 for Individual Honors; What Will
They Do in 1928? Is Question of the Future

their leagues.

NEW YORK.—(AP)—Uncertainty hangs over the heads that wear the crowns
in baseball for there are nearly 400
other athletes trying their best to
knock them off.

Harry Heilmann, of Detroit,
leading batsman of the American
league, has established a program
of leading his fellows at the bat
every other year since 1921 when
he was at the top for the first
time. He repeated in 1923, 1925
and 1927 and while to be consistent
he should stand aside in 1928, he
has been hitting as hard as ever in
spring training.

Paul Waner, the National league
leader, reached the ambition of
the swatsmiths on his second
chance at the title, after having
made a good start on his first ap-
pearance in 1924.

Ruth Home Run King
The home run championship by
common consent belongs to Babe
Ruth. He hit the record breaking
number of 60 last season. There
was a tie between Cy Williams and
Hack Wilson in the National and
Ruth hit as many homers as the
pair of National leaguers.

Opposed to such swatters as
these in this year's renewal of the
eternal battle of hitting against
pitching will be such sterling pitch-
ers as Larry Benton of the Giants
and Waite Hoyt of the Yankees.

and the spilt of sportsmanship,
rather than a certain hate, is with-
in his rivals. No greater proof of
this can be furnished than in a
resume of Hagen's astonishing
achievements in the professional
golfers' championships in the U. S.
A. over a dozen years.

It was in 1916 that Hagen made
his first appearance in the pro-
fessional. He was compara-
tively unknown then—just "one
of the contestants." He won his
first three matches but fell victim
finally to Jack Hutchinson, 2 down.

Here in Defeat
But in defeat he was really a
hero. His splendid play—the
heroic fight made by this young-
ster—established him in golfing
minds as a "comer."

There were no P. G. A. cham-
pionships in 1917 and in 1928
Hagen did not take part in the
tournament of 1919, nor did he
complete in the duelling of 1920.

But in 1921 he was "among
those present"—and emerged the
champion. He won five matches
beating Jack Forrester, Tom Boyd
Johnny Golden, Cyril Walker and
Jim Barnes in succession and, with
the exception of the final, in which

he won from Barnes, 3 and 2, he
almost annihilated his foe.

In 1922 Hagen chose not to de-
fend his laurels and did not par-
ticipate in the tournament of that
year. But in 1923 he was "in
again"—only to bow to Gene
Sarazen in 38 holes in the final
match.

But in 1924 he won the title
back again, repeated in 1925, 1926
and also 1927—a record of five
triumphs in seven starts.

From 1921 to 1927 Hagen lost
only one match of 36 played. In
the years 1924, 1925, 1926, 1927,
he won 29 straight. If he had
beaten Sarazen in 1923, instead of
going down to defeat on the 38th
hole he would have achieved the
astounding record of 39 straight
triumphs in six professional cham-
pionship duels.

Here is Hagen's record as re-
gards his showings among the
"pros": the most remarkable ever
turned in by any golfer and one
that perhaps will endure for an
indefinite number of generations:
