One hundred and forty men from the local unit attended the camp this year. This is regarded as an unusually good attendance.

Seven men, two from company C and five from company M, were honored as 100 per cent men at the camp. This honor is conferred upon guards who have a perfect attendance record for drills during the past year. These men were given special privileges regarding passes at the camp, as well as other forms of recognition.

Company M won the baseball championship of the 162nd Infantry this year. The team was among those in line for the championship of the camp. Many Eugene men took part in other athletic contests held during the two weeks.

The good weather at the encampment this year was a pleasure to everyone. Usually it is either unusually hot or rains all the time. Better weather than was had this year could not have been asked for, the guards report.

On the final night of the encampment the men enjoyed a wester roast and exhibition of fireworks.

TAXPAYERS REDUCE BUDGET BY \$32,000

election. Mr. Keeney is of the opinion that no tax-supported agency, such as the school district, can do business on anything but a credit basis, as the funds are always delayed several months in coming in and as a result are carried over into the next year, when they must be considered as credits.

His motion provoked a long discussion on technical points involved. Several doubted the advisability of doing business in this way, pointing to the fact that this year \$11,000 is appropriated in the budget to pay interest on warrants which are necessarily issued under the credit system, and that if this is subtracted to the district will go on forever sinking money into warrant interest.

The discussion came to a head

when Spencer Collins, accountant for the school district during the past year, declared that if Mr. Keeney's motion carried the warranted debt would be boosted up another \$22,000. He argued the point of law regarding accrued credits of the past year, asserting that the budget must be based on the actual estimated expenditures and receipts for the coming year. In fact, he said, the Eugene district, instead of adding this \$22,000 to the receipts, should reduce the estimated receipts by one per cent for shrinkage.

Mr. Keeney withdrew his second motion, and repeated the first—that the budget, as amended, go before the people. The discussion, it was conceded, brought up several points of vital importance to the school district which can be given consideration in future mapping of financial plans.

The item-by-item study of the budget was accomplished without much discussion, although several questions were raised as Chairman A. L. Gray read the budget as recently published.

Salary Questioned
The first item, that of \$4500 for superintendent, provoked comment from J. O. McCrady that \$4500—the amount to be paid the new superintendent, the other \$1000 to the retiring official—was too much. Charles Emery, a member of the budget committee, declared that a man not worth \$4500 a year had no business at the head of Eugene schools. The item was passed with Chairman Gray pointing out that the contracts were already signed.

Mr. McCrady also questioned the \$3766.58 item for furniture and equipment, and it was noted that \$500 is to be spent on the science department and the same for the manual training at the high school with many other repairs of equipment and furniture being necessary. Mrs. Blaine Hovey asked if the manual training students are paid for houses they build, and the reply was in the negative.

Mayor A. L. Williamson brought up the matter of a new Geary school, declaring that the present building "is an old fire trap, poorly ventilated and insanitary." Chairman W. F. Reed of the district building committee said that the district would build as it could, and was waiting for the reaction from the last building program before launching another.

Wilson Has Trouble
An appropriation of \$3035 for the Wilson school maintenance was questioned, and brought out the fact that a serious ventilation problem underneath the building has developed, with the result that the floor in places is rotting. The difficulty must be remedied. Most of the other small items passed unmentioned upon.

The final figures on the tax to be raised, as hastily worked out by Assessor Keeney, show that the maintenance limit for the year—106 per cent of the figure for last year—is \$152,000.64. With \$20,897.50, bond interest which must be raised and is not limited, added to this, there is a total of \$172,948.14, the total limit.

The original total tax to be raised was \$234,705.70. Subtracted from this is \$22,000, the items eliminated last night, giving a total to be voted of \$202,705.70. From this, the limit noted above is subtracted, giving \$22,757.56.

MANY BALLOTS ARE CAST

STANDINGS IN GODDESS CONTEST ARE UNCHANGED

These figures do not represent the standing of the candidates from the full total of the six days' balloting, but merely show the one day's gain each made.

The standing of the candidates remains the same as announced yesterday. Cyril Igoe holding the lead, followed closely by Libbie Duncan, Dorothy Williamson, Lily Ruth, Maxine Perry, Lottie Gottlieb, Luella Parker, Gertrude Hilliard, Edythe Jacobs and Harriett Van Osdal.

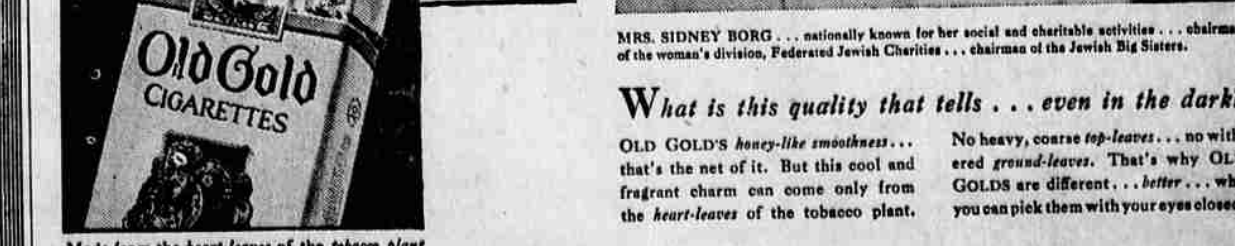
