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JUNCTION PLANT STARTS

LOGANBERRIES AND CHERRIES ARE NOW ARRIVING

Beets Will Soon Be Coming in and Beans Will Follow; Good Run Looked For

(Register Lane County Special)
JUNCTION CITY, Ore., June 27.—The canneries started this season's run this week and both loganberries and cherries are arriving in quantities. About 70 people are at work and the management expects that number to be doubled by the end of the week when the cherries are expected to reach their peak. The cloudy weather is causing the cherries to ripen more slowly than usual and some of the latest growers have not yet started picking.

All black cherries so far received are being packed fresh in 20 pound lots and sent to the plant at Eugene where they are prepared for shipment fresh to distant markets. The Royal Annes are being canned at the local plant.

Mr. Robertson anticipates a steady run of the canneries for several months now as the beets should be ready by the time the cherries are finished. He states that there is an increased acreage of beets this year but owing to unfavorable weather the yield is lighter than last season. However, it is expected that the larger acreage will offset the smaller crop so that the total output will be practically the same as last year.

In addition to beets the canneries this year will handle beans, having signed about 20 acres of irrigated beans from which they expect at least 100 tons. These will be ready at the same time the beets are coming in and will give employment to about 50 additional persons during that time.

From small beginnings several years ago the canneries have grown to be one of the largest single factors in the prosperity of this community. Besides providing an accessible and ready market for the fruits and vegetables the payroll this season will average \$1800 per week.

An innovation at the canneries this year is a well equipped first aid room which is in charge of Mrs. Robertson and where all minor injuries are treated.
