CACHE PROVES MYSTERY
GROVE BURGLAR MAY HAVE
LEFT CLOTHES HERE

Residents at 1236 Agate street
were mystified yesterday morning
when they found several pieces of
wearing apparel in their back yard.
They called police and as a result
officers believe they may have
found a trace of a burglar who
robbed the Cottage Grove phar-
macy Wednesday night. Pocket
knives, cameras, watches, clear-
ettes, a pair of hair clippers and a
bill fold were stolen.

A man, who may have been the
Grove burglar, is believed to have
changed clothes behind the house,
throwing his old ones away and
donning a new outfit. A sweater,
a coat and a pair of trousers were
found back of the dwelling. No
clues were found in the clothes,
except a label which indicated the
coat had been purchased at Kelso,
Wash.

Tracks were found by Derk Ser-

MULKEY TO JOIN KEITH

LOCAL MAGICIAN TO SHOW ON
BIG TIME CIRCUIT

Ex-University of Oregon Student
Now in Vaudeville: Will
Show Here Next Week

Virgil Mulkey, ex-University of
Oregon dramatic student, who is
now one of the leading magicians
in the country, will get his big
chance, as was announced yester-
day when word came from man-
agers of the Keith vaudeville cir-
cuit of New York that he would
be given a contract for the 1928-
29 season. Mulkey, known as
"Virgil and Company" in theatri-
cal circles has spent the last four
years traveling over the United
States and Canada.

The magician arrived here re-
cently on his summer vacation,
the first he has taken in two
years. While a resident here Mul-
key attended both Eugene high
school and the university, appear-
ing in many local entertainments
at the time. He also worked up
a two-hour magical show which
he has played up and down the
Pacific coast. He has appeared at
the Helix here at various times.
Mulkey's present act, which will
be given on the Keith circuit, in-
cludes a number of large illusions.
Outstanding of these is the "East
Indian basket trick" in which a
young lady enters a basket, barely
large enough to contain her. The
basket is pierced from all sides
with swords, and the girl escapes
unharmed.

Mulkey recently attended the
convention of International
Brotherhood of Magicians at Lima,
Ohio, at which 2000 members were
present. He performed his van-
ishing bird cage trick which was
voted the cleverest deception of
the entire convention. Mulkey
is assisted by his assistant Miss
Rosemary Goodman.

Mulkey has been asked to ap-
pear in a special magical con-
cession during the American Legion
Fourth of July celebration here
and will be seen in Hindu magic
numbers.
