

PLAYGROUND BALL TEAM IS ADOPTED BY TEAMS

Games Will Be Played On Wednesday, Thursday

A schedule has been adopted and rule book drawn up for the playground ball league to be run during the summer months by the Playground Community service. The league was announced yesterday. Half the games will be played on Wednesday and the other half on Thursday. Play will start at 6:15 o'clock and the Willard, Condon and Lincoln school grounds will be used.

Organizations entering the league are limited to men in their employ in making up their teams. Each team will furnish an umpire for each game, one to judge balls and strikes and one to judge bases, their duties alternating every other inning.

Entries must be in by noon next Monday and organizations wishing to enter teams should call R. F. Baker, playground director, at 2352 before that time.

An offer by the Morning Register to provide a trophy for the winning team was accepted by the managers.

WOULD REPEAL DRY LAW

PETITION IS ONE OF FOUR INITIATIVE MEASURES

SALEM, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—Petitions for four initiative measures have been handed in at the office of the Marion county clerk and are being checked over by deputies preparatory to being forwarded to the office of the secretary of state.

Petitions asking repeal of all prohibition provisions in the state constitution and all laws having to do with enforcement of prohibition carry over 1,000 Marion county signatures.

The other measures are the state income tax proposal sponsored by the state Grange, bills which would close the Deschutes, Rogue, Umpqua and McKenzie rivers to further hydro-electric development, and the measure to amend the constitution to allow the state government to take state bonds.

Additional signatures are still being sought for all of the petitions.

RINEHART SETS RECORD

YOUNG FLIER REMAINS IN AIR MORE THAN 16 HOURS

SEASIDE, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—After being in the air for 16 hours, 34 minutes and 25 2-10 seconds, Jimmy Rinehart, 15 year old Portland flier, alighted here at 9:15 p. m. tonight in his XX-5 plane, setting a new world record for machines of this class. The former mark was 12 hours and 32 minutes. When the machine landed there were still 10 gallons of fuel in its tank.

Records of the flight were kept by Lieutenant Valentine Gephart, of the navy, of Seattle, secretary of the National Aeronautic society. The barograph on Rinehart's plane is being held for inspection.

A big crowd witnessed the end of the flight, a band serenading the young aviator as he landed.

NORRIS RAPS PLATFORM

DEMOCRATIC OFFERING ALSO SILENT ON POWER TRUST

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29.—(AP)—The Democratic national platform is an unsatisfactory platform, Senator Norris, chairman of the judiciary committee, as was the one adopted by the Republican party at Kansas City.

Senator Norris today denounced the document as "unsatisfactory to progressive minded people in the United States" and "a record of failure to mention what he termed the 'waterpower trust and Muscle Shoals'."

"The Republican platform at Kansas City also was silent on the sinister and deceitful activities of the power trust," the senator said.

HEFLIN SAYS NOMINATION OF SMITH A MISTAKE

TOWANDA, Penn., June 29.—(AP)—When informed here today that Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York had been nominated for the presidency by the Democrats at Houston, Senator J. Thomas Hefflin, of Alabama, declared he was "shocked, grieved and dumfounded."

"Smith's nomination is a mistake," the senator said. "He will, of course, be defeated in November."

TABLE TALKS

Jeanette Beyer

Dear Jeanette Beyer:

A line to let you know I look forward to your Table Talks. And now will you give me some personal assistance? I would appreciate some suggestions on what to serve for an informal table or two of bridge. Something very spring-like and light, also as inexpensive as possible. I am sending you some recipes.—Frances.

My dear lady, I "kiss my brow," when suddenly inspiration comes, and here is exactly the right thing for you. Let me introduce to you at once, an unusual and delightful dessert family, the meringues, and all their dainty relations, the kisses, the glacées, and the macaroons. They are so delicious, so cheap this time of year when eggs are plentiful; they are so simple and easily made that I laugh when I think of them. Meringues will fill your bill exactly, and you can take your choice of which kind of these airy fascinations you will have.

Now the foundation for all the meringue mixtures is merely this: Four egg whites, 1-1/2 cups sugar, 2 tsp. vinegar, 1/4 tsp. vanilla.

Beat the egg whites stiff, add sugar and beat; add other ingredients and beat five minutes. The ingredients are few and the mixing is easy. If these are to be

Fruit Meringues

Grease a baking sheet and drop the meringue mixture with a spoon, using two heaping tablespoons to a mound. Or place in greased muffin tins. Bake very slowly, 275 degrees F., for about an hour. When done, cut and remove the top very carefully. Fill the inside with ice cream or whipped cream and seasonable fresh fruits. Put the top back on and serve with fruit and cream as garnish. This amount will make 10.

Won't these dainty desserts top off your bridge beautifully? Just imagine fresh strawberry meringues or peach meringues!

The making of these desserts is the ticklish business. How easy it is to toughen egg mixtures in a hot oven, and how difficult it is to hold the oven temperature low so that they will be tender and scarcely browned. Egg white is very delicate. The art of meringues is the art of maintaining a slow oven. If your range is difficult to temper down, get a clean board, wet it thoroughly, place paper on that and the meringues on the paper. Wood is a poor conductor of heat and will prevent the meringues from baking very fast.

Kisses are made of the same meringue foundation, but drop in smaller mounds. They may contain a variety of things and are to be eaten like cookies. This amount will make about two dozen.

Date and Nut Kisses

Add to the meringue mixture 1 cup coarsely chopped nuts, and 1 cup dates, washed, stoned and cut into small pieces. Drop on tins and bake at 300 degrees for 25 minutes.

Chocolate Date Kisses

Add to the meringue mixture 1 cup chopped dates and 2 tablespoons of cocoa. The cocoa may be sifted into the egg white with the sugar. Drop by spoonfuls on pans and bake at 300 degrees for 25 minutes.

Cornflake Macaroons

Add to the meringue mixture 1 cup shredded coconut and 3/4 cups of cornflakes. Drop by spoonfuls on a greased pan and bake in a slow oven 300 degrees for about 25 minutes.

close one for a jam that I always make this time of year when my shelves are nearly empty and the fruit season has not yet arrived.

But first may I enlist your help? What can I give a party of young folks in the way of refreshments that are a little unusual? I should like it to be something that they can help with in the preparation.

Last year I made caps and aprons of bright crepe paper in matching colors, and gave each couple something to do at refreshment time. I do not want to repeat that party, but should like something similar.

As to your refreshments, it should be springlike and therefore have strawberries in it. Since it is for young people, there must be some whipped cream or ice cream about it. And since they are going to prepare it, it should be immensely interesting and exciting.

Having slept on these qualifications, I arise this morning to suggest to you—baked Alaska. In other words, baked ice cream, the most amazing, the most exciting and wonder provoking dessert known. Besides that it is luscious to the palate and handsome to look upon. Your young people cannot fail to enjoy its conception which is simple, all tremors to the contrary. It takes but a few minutes to prepare. If you will follow the rules carefully, I'll guarantee a great triumph.
