POWER CREWS ARE BUSY
PREPARATIONS UNDER WAY
FOR EXTENSIVE WORK
Contractors to Be Engaged in
Construction Along Whole
Site in a Short Time

All along the site of the city
power development project near
Leaburg on the McKenzie river,
contractors are busily engaged on
preparations for extensive work on
the new power plant, according to
J. W. McArthur, engineer of the
Eugene water board.

In a short time, the engineer
said, work will be on in full swing
on all three sections of the devel-
opment, the dam, canal and power
house. Plovers and scrapers will be
ready to start work on the canal
right-of-way today. Teams have
been at Leaburg for several days,
but delay in arrival of tools halted
the beginning of scraping and
paving to some extent.

Camps for workmen are about
completed and will be occupied in
a few days. A foot bridge will be
swung across the river at the dam-
site and preparations are being
made to erect a derrick at the site
of the power house.

A new office and bunk house for
water board engineers has been
built at Leaburg, and the men
moved in yesterday.

BIRD BREAKS CIRCUIT
SPARROW CAUSES GREAT
DAMAGE IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., June 28.—
(AP)—A tiny English sparrow just
a few weeks out of his shell caused
damage estimated at several thou-
sands of dollars here today when he
flew into a disconnecting switch in
a Northwestern Electric company
sub-station. He caused a "surge"
which affected the entire west side
wire system of the company and
literally echoed from south Port-
land to Linnton, five miles away.

The sparrow knew nothing of
the grief he caused, for the cur-
rent which stopped a hundred
apartment house elevators and cal-
led out three fire companies and
20 policemen burned his little body
to a crisp.

Fire broke out on poles and in
electrical apparatus, resulting in
three fire companies being called
out.
