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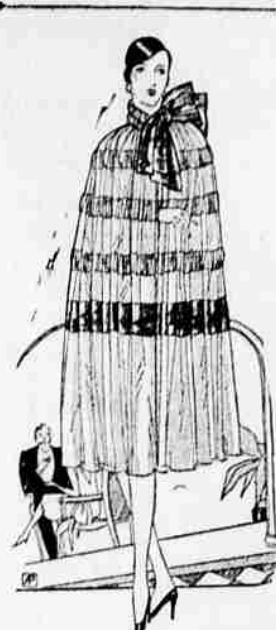
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STRAIGHT from PARIS

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SWIMMING HOLE IS DUG

GRAVEL TAKEN FROM RIVER AT PARK SITE

Eugene Sand and Gravel Company Donates Equipment and Men to Assist City

Work was started yesterday by the Eugene Sand and Gravel company, under J. B. McKy, on digging a swimming hole in the Willamette river at Riverview park. The firm is donating equipment and men for the work, Mayor A. L. Williamson said.

Considerable gravel was taken from the hole yesterday and work will continue on it today. The hole will be about seven or eight feet deep at the deepest place and will decrease in depth until at the bank it will be quite shallow.

A boom will be placed in the river at the edge of the pool and two towers will be built. One will be used by guards and the other for diving purposes.

SCHOOLS NEED REPAIR

BOARD AUTHORIZES SOME OF WORK TO BE DONE

Rest to Wait Until Budget for Year Has Been Voted Upon; Special Meeting Held

Necessary repairs to school buildings will get under way at once, it was decided at a special meeting of the school board last night when the building committee, headed by W. F. Reed, was authorized to start work.

Only such repairs as are deemed necessary at once will be made now and major repairs, for which appropriations have been made in the school budget, will not be started until after the budget election July 24. If the budget is passed, the work will start immediately after the election.

Considerable work is to be done at the Wilson building to protect it from deterioration. In other buildings, roofs will be repaired and plumbing and furnaces gone over.
