Talk on Good Manners

Where Tact is Needed
Dear Mrs. Beckman: In 1914 my wife secured a divorce and custody of four children, three girls and a boy. Neither one of us has remarried and we have been on friendly terms; the children spending their vacations mostly out here on the farm. They have now been self supporting for several years. This coming spring one of the girls will be married. It is to be a church wedding with some decorations and so forth and a reception with some refreshments for the immediate families only, at the home of the bride's mother in the city. Who should give the bride in marriage—the father or twenty-three year-old brother (I or my son)? Where should I be placed at the table?

Also, in case my son is to give the bride in marriage, should I walk up the centre aisle at all, as

is usual before the bridal procession starts?—READER.

This is a difficult situation, I realize, but one which, since you and your wife are friendly to each other, can be managed with ease and dignity. By all means, you should have the honor and privilege of giving your daughter in marriage, that is, if she wishes it. This is very often the solution of this situation, even in cases where the husband and wife are not on very friendly terms.

In the processional, you walk with the bride, last in the procession. When you reach the front of the church, she takes her arm from yours, and the groom steps forward to her side, and she puts her right hand in his arm. In the meantime, you step back a step or two to the left, behind the maid of honor. Here you wait until the part in the ceremony in which you come the words, "Who giveth this woman to be married to this man?" You step forward, place your daughter's hand in the hand of the clergyman, and then you step to your place in the pew that has been assigned to you. This should not be the pew in which your ex-wife is seated, but two or three pews behind her. This should be definitely arranged before the wedding, of course. Then you may or may not go to the reception. If you do decide to go, you should use the utmost of tact and, I should think, not stay very long. Just long enough to offer your good wishes to your daughter and your congratulations to her husband. I think, too, that it would be vastly better and easier for you and for everyone else if you do not stay to the "all-down" wedding feast.

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COLLEGE TO BE MOVED

BUSINESS SCHOOL LEASES MINER ANNEX ROOMS

Location Now Held by Lucile's Tea Room to Be Remodeled for Use of Institute

After being housed for eight years in the building at the northwest corner of Tenth avenue and Commercial street, the Eugene Business college will move this summer to the Miner building annex, on East Broadway. It was announced yesterday by A. E. Roberts, president.

The college has leased the second floor of the annex, which is now occupied by Lucile's tea room. Mrs. Lucile Warner, proprietor of the tea room, is planning to move her business. The location will be extensively remodeled in order to provide class rooms for some 125 students. Equipment will be entirely overhauled and the same staff of teachers will be employed in the new place. Same service to students and business men as at present will be given. Plans are being made to move the college during the latter part of August in order that the school year will begin in September.

When Mr. Roberts came here to take over the college 10 years ago, it was located in the building across the street from the Miner building, now occupied by the Home apartments. The college was founded in 1910.

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION ANNOUNCES TESTS

MORE HELP IS NEEDED AT EUGENE CANNERY

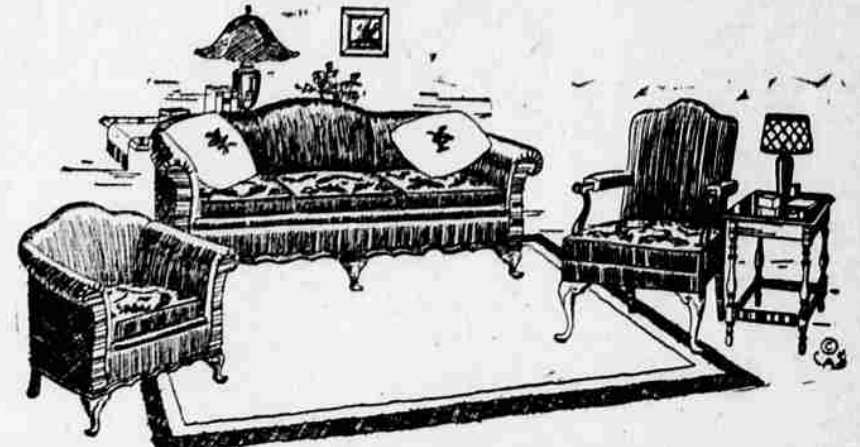

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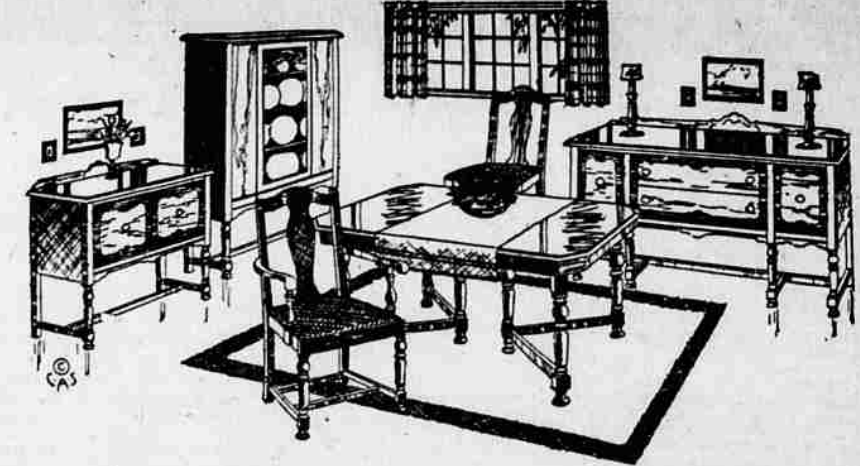
