CRESWELL, Ore., July 2.—Lans County Pomona Grange met Saturday at Creswell in an all-day session with a bountiful basket dinner at noon. Pomona Master F. B. Harlow, presiding at 10:30 o'clock with the fifth degree. Fourth degree followed and 18 members responded.

Goheen carried off the honors and the officiating pennant by having the greatest number of points amounting to 88 per cent. Reports from the following Granges were: Creston, Wolf Point, Goshon, Four Oaks, Creswell, Linslaw, Elmira, Crow and Willakene.

The home economics committee report was given by the chairman, Mrs. F. B. Harlow, who urged all Granges to plan for a canned fruit exhibit to be placed at the county fair. A chair had been purchased by the Pomona Grange and presented to the rest cottage in Eugene.

Announcement was made that through business done in the Grange, which consisted of the chambers of Siuslaw, Eugene, Junction City, Cottage Grove, Springfield, Pomona Grange and the Farmers' Union.

Lans county is the third highest contributor to the state road program and over half of the uncompleted roads of western Oregon are in Lans county.

A committee was appointed to arrange for the annual Pomona picnic.
