WASHINGTON, D. C., July 4.—
Secretary Hoover made the
complete holiday aban-
donment of official and political
duties for a few personal
days. In the way of callers,
and a short automobile ride,
were prospects in sight for
the balance of the week, and
an opportunity today for
the relaxation.

Republican leaders have decided
to spend their eastern cam-
paign at a meeting in which
they are expected to partici-
pate. Chairman Work has sum-
moned all members of the na-
tional committee for the group of
senators, and in addition
to Pennsylvania and Maryland
to the capital to meet
Mr. Hoover, who is generally ex-
pected to be manager of the Re-
publican campaign in the east.
The meeting will be held at the
National Hotel, after this
morning, the national chair-
man and Secretary Hoover may
in other such regional gath-
erings.

Plans On Trip West

In the Saturday meeting with
senators, Mr. Hoover will be prac-
tically to start west. It was
officially reported today that
the program had been definitely
settled and that he would visit
Mr. Coolidge on the route
from Wisconsin, to present his
views from the cabinet. It
was added that the president
meeting him, and that fur-

MEASURE FOR HIGHWAYS APPROVED BY COOLIDGE

Assures Federal Aid in Sum
of \$75,000,000

TWO YEARS OF BUILDING

Bill Also Carries \$7,500,000 for the
Construction of Forest Roads
and Trails

WASHINGTON, July 4.—Appro-
val by President Coolidge of the
bill authorizing Federal-Aid ap-
propriations of \$75,000,000 for
highway building in each of the
fiscal years 1929 and 1931, assures
continuation of this program
which has resulted in the building
of close to 75,000 miles of im-
portant interstate highways and has
provided the needed impetus to
road construction by the states.

This statement was issued to-
day by National Headquarters of the
American Automobile association,
which fostered the federal-
aid program and since 1921 has
represented the car-owners of the
nation in repelling every attempt
to halt this important assistance
by the federal government in road
building.

Assures Better Forest Roads

In addition to the appropriations
for main highways, says the A. A.
A., the measure signed by the Pres-
ident also carries \$7,500,000 for
each of the two fiscal years for
building of forest roads and trails.

The national motor body
pointed out that since 1921 a total
of nearly a billion and a half dol-
lars has been spent on the nearly
75,000 miles of the original Fed-
eral-Aid program of some 135,000
miles of important interstate routes
and that it is well over one-third
completed. Of this amount, says
the A. A. A., the federal govern-
ment has contributed \$414,649,253
and there are 11,510 miles of high-
way under construction in this net-
work of important roads to which
the government will contribute
\$126,486,015.

The appropriations for 1930 and
1931 are in line with the exist-
ing policy of making such authori-
zations two years in advance in
order to provide continuity of work
on the federal-aid system and al-
low federal and state agencies
ample time to outline the construc-
tion program.

Incentive for Building

"Its importance," says Thos. P.
Henry, president of the national
motor body, "is shown by the
fact that it is an incentive to road
building by the states as nearly
two miles are constructed by the
States for each mile built with
Federal cooperation.

"There have been numerous at-
tempts by private interests and by
some governmental agencies to
halt the federal-aid program.
Each and all of these also a tri-
bute to the large vision of Congress
that it always has been quick to
ignore attacks on federal-aid and
by overwhelming majorities has
maintained a national policy which
is doing so much to advance the
transportation needs, to promote
the development of our resources,
to further social well-being, to
eliminate sectionalism and encour-
age national solidarity."

VICTIMS OF ACCIDENTS ASSURED OF BETTER AID

Move Started by A.A.A. Is
Given Surgeons Approval

WOULD LIST HOSPITALS

Henry is Advised that Campaign of
Safety "Afterwards" is Bound
to Give Results

WASHINGTON, July 4.—The
movement recently started by the
American Automobile association
for a higher standard of hospital
treatment for the victims of auto-
mobile accidents has received the
whole-hearted endorsement of the
American College of Surgeons.

The endorsement of the College
of Surgeons, which consists of 8,
000 of the leading surgeons of the
United States, Canada and Latin
America, took the form of a letter
from Dr. Franklin H. Martin, di-
rector general of the college, to
Thos. P. Henry, president of the
American Automobile association.

Dr. Martin pointed out that the
interest of the world's largest motor
federation in the question of
"safety afterwards" would materi-
ally aid in mobilizing public senti-
ment around what the College of
Surgeons is doing to put into ef-
fect "a minimum standard of ef-
ficiency with which all hospitals
and surgeons should comply."

Listing of Hospitals Approved

He suggested that the A. A. A.
utilize for the information of mo-
torists the list of hospitals in the
United States and Canada ap-
proved by the College of Surgeons.
This list includes over 90 per cent
of the hospitals in the United
States and Canada with a capacity
of 100 beds or over.

Dr. Martin's letter to President
Henry follows:

"My attention has been drawn to
a recent article in the public press,
entitled 'Better Care of Auto Vic-
tims,' wherein the interest of your
great organization in the treat-
ment of the injured is expressed.
Inasmuch as you have cited the
findings of our research group of
the board on traumatic surgery,
and as our college is actively en-
gaged on this very subject of im-
provement in the care of the in-
jured, it seems appropriate to
make a brief statement concerning
the college, and its aims in this
particular direction.

Surgeons Wage Campaign

"The American College of Sur-
geons is an organization of over
8,000 of the leading surgeons of
the United States, Canada and La-
tin America. Their organized effort
to improve hospitals and surgical
service was begun over ten years
ago. Their initial step was the
formulation of a minimum stan-
dard of efficiency with which all
hospitals and surgeons should com-
ply. Over 90 per cent of all hospi-
tals in the United States and Can-
ada, with a capacity of 100 beds
and over, are now complying with
this minimum standard, and are
upon the approved list of the col-
lege; and a constantly increasing
number of the smaller hospitals
are complying and are approved
as rapidly as the facts justify. In

JOE ROBINSON SPEAKER

NOMINEE MAKES PLEA FOR
RELIGIOUS TOLERANCE

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 4.—
(AP)—Senator Joseph T. Robinson
sounded a plea for religious toler-
ance at an Independence Day cele-
bration here today in his first for-
mal address since he was nomi-
nated for vice-president on the Demo-
cratic ticket.

The celebration was a state wide
event under the auspices of the
Little Rock and North Little Rock
posts of the American Legion, giv-
ing in honor of Arkansas' first no-
minee on a national political ticket.

"The age of bigotry has passed,"
he declared. "The battalions that
advance under the black banner of
intolerance can never undermine or
destroy the fortress of liberty."

SPAFFORD IS SPEAKER

LEGION HEAD ADVISES CARE
IN CASTING VOTES

CLEARFIELD, Pa., July 4.—
(AP)—Edward E. Spafford, na-
tional commander of the American
Legion, today called upon all mem-
bers of the Legion and Legion aux-
iliary to cast their votes in the
fall election after a careful study
of party platforms.

In an Independence Day speech
here, he said that the revolutionary
war was brought to a head because
American colonists were denied the
right of English subjects, hav-
ing sufficient representation in the
British parliament.

Fourth Casualties Heavy

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 4.—
(AP)—Ten deaths, one probable
drowning, and a probable auto race
fatality, were recorded tonight in
and about Los Angeles as Fourth
of July casualties. Three deaths
were suicidal, four were traffic
fatalities, one was believed due to
holiday liquor; a youth was mis-
sing after going for a swim in the
early morning, and a child died
after being struck on the head by
a whirling wheel thrown from a
racing automobile. Another sui-
cidal attempt was expected to
prove fatal.

Sid Smith, Comedian, Dies

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., July 4.—
(AP)—Sid Smith, 35 year old mo-
tion picture comedian, died sud-
denly this afternoon shortly after
attending a beach party with sev-
eral friends of the film colony.
Doctors who attended Smith in his
last moments said he muttered
something about "gin" he had
drunk at the party from a stone
crock. A severe attack of stomach
cramps preceded his death.
