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BERLINGER NEW DECATHLON HOPE

Penn Freshman Arrives to Brighten United States Hopes
for Victory in Olympic All-Around Track and Field Test



A new star has risen to brighten United States hopes for victory in the Olympic all-around track and field test. Although but 19 and in his first year at Penn, Barney Berlinger (above), former one-man track team at Mercersburg, has been named the national and Olympic champion in a recent seven-event tilt at Madison Square garden.

NEW YORK, July 4.—(AP)—America's newest and most promising hope in quest of Olympic all-around athletic honors is a 19-year-old Pennsylvania freshman, Barney Berlinger.

This rugged youth, in fact, may be one of Uncle Sam's chief contenders in the Olympic decathlon, especially if the present champion, the veteran Harold Osborn, is unable to stage a comeback. Berlinger has never competed in the decathlon but the prowess he displayed in defeating the country's greatest all-around stars in a seven-event test at the Knights of Columbus carnival stamped him as one of the most versatile performers developed in years.

Takes Measure of Star
This young college star now a pupil of the Olympic head coach, Lawson Robertson, not only conquered Osborn but took the measure of the sensational Nebraska Indian athlete, Falt ("Chief") Elkins, who holds the national title and record in the decathlon, and Emerson Norton, 1924 Olympic runner-up.

Berlinger's point total for this septathlon, 5719 compared favorably with the sensational mark of 5882, registered by the Vaulting

The boys who grope around for fiction plots might clip a few pages from the book of Jess Willard's life—which reads like an Alger romance.

Put Johnson to Canvas
"Poor Jess," they said, and promptly set 2 to 1 that he'd be annihilated. But Jess kicked his whiskers out of the way, so he wouldn't trip on them and accompanied by a bit of wheezing and lots of puffing he knocked out Johnson—getting the \$25,000 for his efforts.

After that they chucked him into the ring with Luis Firpo. Jess insisted upon the major portion of the spoils owing to several facts, two of them being that he was the bigger man and also one of the homebreds. It wasn't much of a fight.
