GOVERNOR VISITS CAL

ZIMMERMAN OF WISCONSIN

Today President Goes to Superior
For Bi-Weekly Visit at
Executive Offices

SUPERIOR, Wis., July 5. —
(AP)—President Coolidge found a
new fishing companion today in
Governor Fred H. Zimmerman of
Wisconsin, whom he invited to
come for a day and night visit to
Cedar Island Lodge.

President Coolidge had gone
fishing before the Wisconsin gov-
ernor reached the executive resi-
dence. He returned, however, to
bid his guest welcome and then
suggested fishing again. Governor
Zimmerman will leave the lodge
tomorrow with President Coolidge
when the latter will come to Su-
perior for his bi-weekly call at
his offices.

At that time it will be the turn
of Governor Christensen of Min-
nesota, and Representative Ander-
sen, to be received by Mr. Coolidge.
An engagement was made today
for the chief executive of the
neighboring state to pay his re-
spects to President Coolidge. He
will invite President Coolidge to
play golf at a Duluth
country club. The trip, made in
an automobile was not advertised
and his appearance in the neigh-
borhood was hardly noticed.

STAMP MARKET MOVING

WILL BE TRANSFERRED FROM
PARIS TO BRUSSELS

PARIS, July 4. —(AP)—The in-
ternational postage stamp market
is apparently to be transferred
from Paris to Brussels.

For 50 years Paris has been the
recognized gathering place for
stamp collectors, with an annual
congress, held on several occasions
at the Sorbonne, and weekly sales
when weather permitted under the
trees of the Champs Elysees. As
the result of the decision of the
French government to exercise a
control over all sales, even those
between amateur collectors, and
to tax all profits, the principal
French dealers have decided to
open branches in the Belgian capi-
tal. They have received assurances
that under the Belgian laws there
will be no taxes imposed when the
transfers are shown to be for pur-
poses of completing collections and
the buyers and sellers are known
to be amateurs and not profes-
sional dealers.

Although the line of demarcation
seems vague, the promise has been
