

OILING STARTS TODAY

MCKENZIE HIGHWAY WORK TO BEGIN AT WALTHERVILLE
Crew Will Come Toward Springfield; City Streets to Get Coat Later

(Register Lane County Special)
Oiling of the McKenzie highway between Springfield and Waltherville will begin Friday morning after a delay of several weeks, it was announced today by Raymond Walsh, resident engineer for the state highway commission who is foreman of the work. Crews of men have been on the location for several days waiting until after the heavy holiday traffic subsided. The road will be kept open to traffic during the time the oiling is being done with only occasional stops during the day while the oil is spread and covered with gravel. All material and machinery is in place so that work will go ahead. It is not known how long the job will take.

East Main street to its junction with the pavement and the second street section to the bridge and beyond the highway will be given an oiling as soon as the highway stretch is completed. This section was oiled last year and proved so satisfactory that city officials asked that it be oiled again. The coat put on last year will make a good foundation for the work this season.

STEEL IS BEING PLACED

NEW BRIDGE AT SPRINGFIELD TAKING FORM

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., July 5.—Placing of the structural steel in the new McKenzie highway bridge over the Willamette river was started today on schedule time. The material has been arriving all week and is now being hauled to the bridge location and placed in the derick to hoist into position.

Construction on the bridge is coming along in record time. The four immense piers have been poured and are now sufficiently hardened for the removal of the forms. The recent decision of the state highway commission to add a 25 foot span on the Springfield side is not slowing up the work. Pouring of the cement for the approaches will start soon, it is announced.

The steel girders will not be in shape for the riveters to begin operations for about a month, it is stated.

The late Mr. Glendenning was at one time chief of police of Springfield.
