WILL COMING FIGHT DRAW CROWD?

Speculation Is Rife in Drawing Power of Tunney-Heeney Match This Month

A dual test in the matter of fistie finance will transpire on July 26th which is meeting night for Gene Tunney and Tom Heeney.

Then—and only then—will the wildly excited human race come to know whether the right racket is still of great public appeal and whether Tunney going on his own, as a drawing card, can pack in the cash customers.

For a long, long time some folks have argued that it was Jack Dempsey, and the magnetism of him, that caused pop-eyed rushes to various stadiums whenever he battled. Others took the attitude that the dear come-on pepul had just gone fight goofy and that any old champion would have packed 'em in the same as Dempsey.

Now, as the magician said, extracting three fish bowls from his hat, we shall see what we shall see.

It's true that Tom Heeney does not strike the man in the street as a real menace to Tunney's reign. And, because Tunney will not have a foe man facing him who has a lure of his own, it means that Tunney isn't getting any of the "breaks" in the effort to draw as huge a house as Dempsey did.

But it must be pointed out that Dempsey, in all the days of his reign, never drew any rival in the other corner who wasn't supposed to be outclassed at the start. No one that Dempsey grew seemed any more of a hurdle for him to take than Heeney seems to be in Tunney's life.

It's 3 to 1 that Tunney whips Heeney. And it was just about that on Dempsey to win from Mike, Brennan, Carpenter, Gibson, Firpo and Tunney. So all evenstephen here. Tunney's presumed superiority over Heeney is no greater than was Dempsey's over all those he met while Dempsey, fighting his first battle as champion in 1920, drew 20,000 customers and a gate around \$135,000. From that point he scaled upward by leaps and bounds, drawing three successive "over one million" gates—Carpenter, Firpo and Tunney in Philadelphia. When he fought Jack Sharkey and then, when he met Tunney as a challenger, the pair drew around \$2,000,000 and a crowd of 140,000. Dempsey against Firpo in New York in 1923 and against Sharkey in 1927 fought with \$25 as top prices for seats. If the tops had been \$40 as they will be for the Tunney-Heeney fight both "gates" would have hit around \$1,600,000.

What will Tunney and Heeney do at \$40 tops? Rickard insists "It will go beyond \$2,000,000. If it does that, then that would prove that Tunney is a greater card, against relative loemen, than was Dempsey."

John Dominick Public, however, sticks to the notion that if the "house" totals \$1,000,000 even Rickard will exclaim in delighted surprise. If John Dominick is correct, it means that Tunney, as champion, fighting in an arena that has 20,000 more seats than in Dempsey's time, and with prices at least 25 per cent higher will fall far short of Dempsey's mark.

If that transpired, two reasons could be assigned. One is that Tunney hasn't the same appeal as the old "killer"—or it can mean that the public has soured somewhat on paying fancy prices for fistie shows.

And the latter would be the more accurate guess. For all around the Gotham district the interest in fights and fighters seems to be ebbing and every indication is that the "Golden Era" lies behind and that the day of million dollar gates is gone forever.

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EUGENE TEAM WORKS OUT FOR BEND GAME

Central Oregon Squad Has Lyle Bigbee in Lineup

The Eugene baseball club of the Willamette valley league went through a fast workout last night on the University of Oregon diamond, in preparation for the tilt next Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock on the fairgrounds diamond with the league-leading Bend Eagles.

Practically every player on the Eugene team was out last night, and both infield work and batting practice was in order. The team looked more serious than at any other practice session this season, and from indications, Bend will run up against a surprise if she expects anything easy from the Eugene nine.

Eugene's fielding and hitting strength has been added to since the last home game, Les Johnson, one of the leading hitters on the University of Oregon championship varsity this season, is on first base. This move adds to the fielding efficiency of the team, and to the hitting strength as well. Buck Grayson, who was playing first, has been shifted to the outfield, so his hitting ability will still be felt, and he has proven a better outfielder than first baseman.

Cotter Gould, another member of the university team this season, is also an addition to the outfield since the last home game. He has been swatting the pellet over 400 so far.

One of the most colorful players in the league will be brought to Eugene when the Bend game comes over, in the person of Lyle Bigbee. Bigbee is a former University of Oregon player, some 15 years ago. He and his brother, Carson Bigbee, both played on the Oregon varsity. Later Carson went into the major leagues, but his eyes bothered him, and he had to quit. Until his eyes went bad he was one of the heaviest hitters on the list.

Lyle Bigbee went to the Pacific International league after his playing at Oregon. Later he played with the Milwaukee team of the American association, and then went into wildcat baseball in Arizona.
