REGISTER FOREIGN CARS

INFORMATION GIVEN REGARD-
ING REQUIREMENTS

Registration Stations have been
Established by Secretary of
State in Many Places

The number of foreign registra-
tions seen on the highways of
Oregon at this time of the year calls
for information regarding the re-
quirements of the state of Oregon
relative to registering cars bearing
foreign licenses, said A. E. Shearer,
manager of the touring depart-
ment of the Oregon State Motor
association.

Oregon has a reciprocal agree-
ment with the various states of
the union and the requirements
for the foreign car within the
state are not at all stringent. A
motor vehicle licensed in another
state must be registered within 72
hours after entering the state of
Oregon.

Registration stations have been
established by the Secretary of
the State in many places throughout
the state and the Oregon State
Motor association registers cars at
its main office and each of its 15
branches.

In registering the automobile the
make of car, type of car, engine
number and state of registration
must be given. The name of the
owner and home address, where
staying in Oregon, when car en-
tered state and approximate date
of the car in the state must also
be given.

Registrars issue a permit
in the form of a sticker to be
placed on the windshield showing
that the car has been registered.
This permit is issued for ninety
days. Only one permit can be
issued in any one year on any car
—provided however that the sec-
retary of State may issue an ex-
tension if the applicant can show
that he has not become a resident
of Oregon. To obtain this exten-
sion it is necessary to apply direct
to the Secretary of State, giving
