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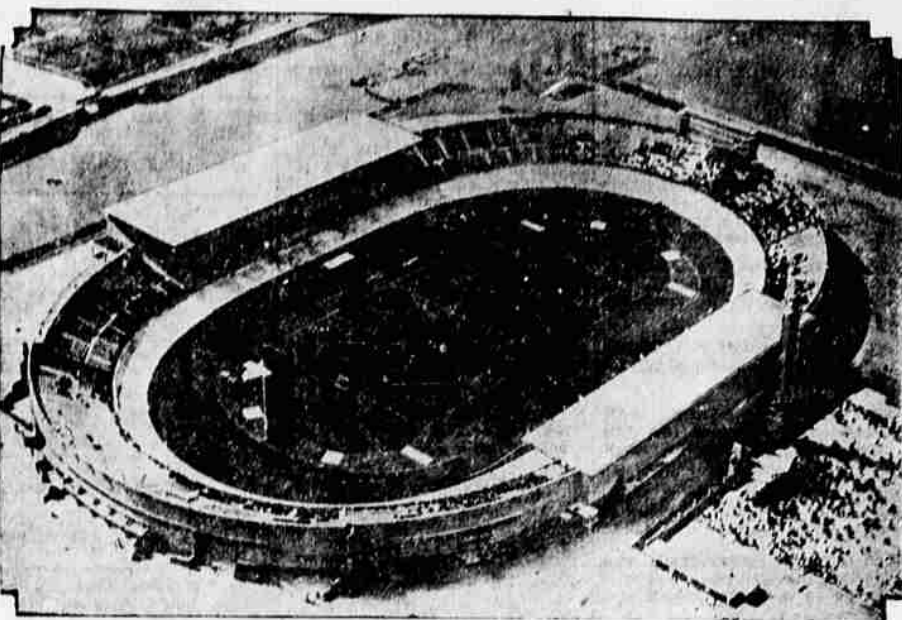

## BROOKLYN CAPTAIN INCITES A RIOT

Max Carey Makes Life Unhappy for Umpires as His Team Glimpses Pennant; Other Diamond Notes

Old age accomplishes a variety of quaint things. I have in mind the transformation of a nice exemplary baseball player into a bloke who got himself suspended for "inciting a riot."

The heavy villain of the piece is Max Carey, who started off in life with the idea of becoming a preacher and then detoured for the ball park. During his first years as a diamond performer, Carey's conduct was such that all mammas and papas pointed to him and said to their little ones:

"He like him."  
But the parents aren't doing it any more. For Max got all excited this year over the fact that the Brooklyn team, which he captains, has at least a mild chance to share the pennant and he is making life a most unhappy existence for umpires.

The climax arrived just so long ago when an official ruled against Max's team, whereupon Max emitted shrill cries of anger, did the whirling dervish dance and by his language and his conduct is supposed to have incited the Brooklyn fans to a point where they showered pop bottles in the general direction of the umpire.

In about ten years more, Max perhaps will have become so belligerent that he'll be raising around firing challenges at Tunney or whoever is champion tough mugg a decade hence.

"This kid," comments Hendricks, "is the only man I've ever seen who actually slugs and hunts from the same stance and with the same motion. I've watched him day after day, week after week, to see if I could figure out whether he was going to lay one down or ram it a mile."

"And I can't tag him. If I can't, then it's a cinch that opposing teams, which play against him only occasionally, aren't going to solve him."

"Callaghan's deceptive batting style is one great factor in his favor when he decides to hunt. The second thing is that he can place a ball almost where he will. The third asset is his great speed, for this boy is one of the fastest players in the big leagues today."

It would seem, from a glance at the vital statistics of baseball, that Callaghan can do plenty of other things in addition to successful practice of the tap-tap art. For he has been out with considerable vigor and regularity and is the young man who has been pressing Rogers Hornsby for the batting leadership of the league.

"As an outfielder," continues Hendricks, "I am not going to say that he is in a class with Eddie Roush. He's a bit too young and not sufficiently seasoned. But with his accuracy in judging fly balls, his great throwing arm and his fleetness, I'll make the prediction that if he continues to improve for another year or two he will be proclaimed among the truly great outfielders of all time."

Did you know that some of the baseball magnates really have come to conclude that there's entirely too much of this home-run stuff now and that there is agitation for an inter-league rule like this:

(a) A hit shall be regarded as a home run only if it is knocked out of the park or when a player circles the bases on a ball hit over an outfielder's head;

(b) All hits into the stands shall be regarded as two or three base hits, according to the distance of the stands from home plate.

## PLAYERS REACH FINALS IN OREGON TENNIS TOURNAMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—Joe Coughlin, San Francisco, advanced to the finals of the men's singles in the Oregon state tennis championships today, when he eliminated Howard Langle, Seattle, in a warmly contested first set match.

Coughlin won the first set, 6-1, but Langle came back in the second and took it, 7-5. In the third set, with the games tied at four all, Coughlin ran out to win.

Bradshaw Harrison, 1927 champion of San Francisco, and Henry Prusoff, Seattle, will vie in the other bracket to determine who will meet Coughlin in the finals. Harrison is expected to duplicate his victory again this year.

In the men's doubles, Harrison and Sidney Smith, Tacoma, will meet Coughlin, paired with Lorraine Driscoll, San Francisco.

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## LACOSTE WINS TENNIS SINGLES FROM COCHET

Youth Takes Title Fourth Time in 5 Years

## HELEN TO PLAY TODAY

AT WIMBLEDON, July 6.—(AP)—Lacoste, master of defensive tennis, today turned aggressor to beat Henri Cochet and win the Wimbledon singles. England for the fourth time in the last five years watched two French finalists in the match, which was an anticlimax to the thrilling international contests of the last two weeks.

Cochet, seeming determined to defend his title, lost it to a steady youth, who, advancing to the attack from the first game, never was headed. In accuracy, forefulness and steadiness, Lacoste was superior. Cochet went down in four sets, 6-1, 4-1, 6-4, 6-2.

Another American pair suffered today. Frank Hunter and Helen Willis bowing to the superior doubles combination of P. D. B. Spence and Elizabeth Ryan.

Miss Willis in her singles final against Senorita Ella de Alvarez and Miss Ryan in the mid-doubles, are the only Americans left for the final day's play.

The Spanish girl was not scratched and said today that her slight illness will not prevent her appearances against the champion tomorrow.

Miss Ryan and Spence will play Oxford and Daphne Akhurst. Chief interest tomorrow will center in the doubles finals between Gerald Patterson and J. B. Hawkes, Australia, against Henri Cochet and Jacques Brugnon with the Australian conquerors of Tilden and Hunter made the favorites over the French team.

The women's doubles to be played tomorrow will send Miss P. Mason and Mrs. Holcroft Watson against Misses Emyntine Harvey and Evelyn Bennett.

## BEAR CREW WINS RACE

OLYMPIC CONTENDERS TO MEET YALE OARSMEN

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 6.—(AP)—The University of California eight-oared crew joined Yale in the final for the right to represent the United States in the Olympic games by defeating Columbia today by half a length in a semi-final heat in the trials on the Schuylkill river.

The Golden Bears swept over the river to win in five minutes, 29.35 seconds for the 2000 meter course, while Columbia in the tight sight up to the finish, covered the distance in 3:22.4-5.

Yale defeated Princeton by half a length in the other semi-final heat of the Olympic rowing trials.

Yale turned in the phenomenally fast time of 5 minutes 18.4-5 seconds for the 2000 meters. Princeton was right behind in 5:19.2-5.

## DEMERS BETTERS WORLD JAVELIN MARK IN EAST

James Demers of Eugene is causing a sensation in eastern track circles.

Demers, who was sent to the final Olympic tryouts to be held at Boston this weekend, Thursday threw the javelin, his special event, 220 feet in a workout at Philadelphia under supervision of William Hayward, Oregon cinder coach, who is now a member of the Olympic training staff.

Word was received from Hayward yesterday giving the distance of the practice throw and stating that Demers is a cinch for the Olympic team.

Demers is the only track candidate from this state with an opportunity to make the United States team. Victor Wetzel, Web-foot decathlon candidate, failed to place in the final tryouts at

Philadelphia completed Thursday. He sprained an ankle, according to word received from Hayward, and didn't complete the trials. He withdrew his entry from the 1500-meter run.

The throw of 220 feet in the javelin by Demers bettered the present world record of 218 feet 6 inches. Demers' toss, though, was in practice and does not count as an official mark. Should he duplicate the feat in the Boston tryouts his mark then would become official as the world record.

Hayward states that he is showing fine form and should break the record during the tryouts.
