"Bob or Dick anywhere around?" Part of a conversation to be heard almost any day and hour out at the Eugene Golf and Country Club. The question refers to Bob and Dick Near, Eagle Scout and potential Eagle Scout who for the past three or four years have spent their spare hours from school and scouting in caddying at the golf club, growing up, saving their money, and getting acquainted with the members and business men. They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Near, 1234 Lincoln street, and their father is now in Tillamook as manager of J. C. Brier's store.

This same group of men, many of whom have served on the Boy Scout council and as advisers and leaders in the Scout movement in Eugene, have watched the Near boys grow from chubby, awkward, funny little gangling youngsters into mature, well-balanced, athletic and disciplined youths.

Which has yet to weather the age of squeaking voice, uncertain manners, thoughtless fun-making, which has yet to experience those growing pains whose result is a plus amount of mental and physical development, a new outlook on life, and an awakening of serious ambition and purpose.

It was back in the days when Troop 1 of the Boy Scouts was newly organized that Bob and Dick tied their knots, and built their fires, and qualified for their tenderfoot badges which entitled them to the coveted Scout uniform and the gay neckerchief with which every Scout adorns himself as soon as possible. With Troop 1 they played games, entered contests, took amateur hikes, attended meetings.

They progressed steadily from merit badge to merit badge, from tenderfoot to first class scout, on up through the ranks, fascinated by a work and study and companionship which was precious and pleasure to them, and priceless education as well. The climax was the Eagle Scout badge for Bob, and the super-climax will be when Dick receives the coveted trophy for proficiency in the world of scouting, which will be at the next court of awards.

How many of us, for instance, turned loose alone in the isolated woods, would prove capable of shifting for ourselves in the way of rustling food, shelter, clothing, protection? The merit badge for camping requires all this and more—and it is just one of the eleven absolutely required badges for Eagle Scouts. Twenty-one is the total number needed for this rank, but the additional ten may be chosen from a number of other merit badge awards.

Again, how many of us know much about bird study, save to recognize the robin and his lonely evening song, the chattering grosbeak with his olive-green and white dress, the sparrow and hummingbird and woodpecker and all the rest of our familiar, ever-present bird family? Pioneering is another of the required accomplishments of an Eagle Scout; he must likewise know how to cook, how to save, how to swim proficiently. He must be a student of civics and know the elements of government; he must have personal health and a regard for its value, and he must have knowledge of the things which make for public health. And lastly, he must be the possessor of athletic merit badges.

Bob will finish Eugene high school in 1925, Dick two years later. Both are members of the "E" club, Bob having won his letters in baseball, tennis and golf, and Dick in football and golf. "Don't you both hold student offices out at high school," we asked.

HELEN WILLS RETAINS
WORLD TENNIS CROWN

WIMBLEDON, England, July 7.—(AP)—In a victory that developed dramatic possibilities unlooked for when Helen Wills is riding the courts, the queen of American tennis today conquered Senorita Elia de Alvarez of Spain in the women's singles final of the Wimbledon championships to gain the crown for the second straight year.

The American youngster, not as accurate as usual and somewhat off form generally, beat the Spanish girl, 6-2, 6-3, but not until Senorita Alvarez had led 3-0 in the final session.

Regaining her speed and striking control, Miss Wills ran out the next six games in fine style to clinch the match and the unofficial title of world's champion for the second time in succession.

Of all the American stars, Miss Wills alone captured a Wimbledon championship from the huge field that opened two weeks ago in the annual blue ribbon tournament of the tennis world.

Miss Elizabeth Ryan, former Californian won the mixed doubles partnered with P. D. F. Spence of South Africa, 7-5, 6-4, but the British claim the victory because of Miss Ryan's long residence in England. Big Bill Tilden, eliminated from the singles, and Francis T. Hunter, his partner in
