neither is known. They never
have competed under Webfoot
colors as Moe was a freshman last
year and Harrison ineligible to
play as he transferred last fall.
But Harrison now holds the Pa-
cific northwest and Oregon state
single tennis championships, won
in tournament recently. He also
held the 1927 titles in both divi-
sions. Moe last month won the
Oregon state golf title and was
runner-up to the title in the Pacific
northwest tourney.

Oregon is believed now in a po-
sition to claim a unique record.
Two athletes here hold state
titles, yet neither has won a Web-
foot emblem. However, both will
compete under Oregon colors next
spring and should then become
regular members of the Order of
the "O." They also should gain
a higher reputation than they now
have. Plans already are under
way to send Harrison east to com-
pete in the national intercollegiate
individual championship tennis
tournament to be held next June.
Moe also is slated for a trip east
to enter the national intercollegi-
ate golf championships.

Harrison, when he enrolls again
this fall, will have completed the
one-year residence rule which
covers the transfer of an athlete
from one institution to another. He
came here from University of Cal-
ifornia last fall. Moe has com-
pleted his freshman year and this
year will be eligible for varsity
competition. With this pair, and
other performers almost their
equal in ability, the Webfoot
should win two Pacific coast con-
ference championships at least
next spring. Both are way above
the average collegiate competitor.

DRUBBING FROM EUGENE

As neat a trimming as ever was
handed to champions or potential
champions was handed to the
Bend Eagles of the Willamette val-
ley league Sunday by the Eugene
team. The score was 7 to 1.

The Bend team was leading the
league until the Sunday game,
now, with the first round ended,
Bend led for the leadership with
Salem and Albany. Eugene
next in line Salem barely won
from Wendling, 4 to 3, pushing
across the winning run in the
ninth inning. Albany defeated
Cottage Grove, 6 to 1.

After the Sunday game, the
managers of the league met at
the chamber of commerce, and
adopted the schedule for the re-
mainder of the season, or the sec-
ond round of league play. As a
result, Eugene will clash with
Bend next Sunday at Bend.

Wendling and Cottage Grove, the
two lowest teams in the circuit
standing, were dropped from the
league for the last round, accord-
ing to a previous agreement, and
Eugene, Salem, Albany and Bend
will battle it out. The Sunday
games will be the first in the
new round to determine the cham-
pionship of the league.

The first three innings of the
Sunday Bend-Eugene game were
even up, but Eugene started the
fireworks in the fourth. Billy
Reinhart doubled to left field, and
Bliss sent him to third on a sacri-
fice. Golder drove out the
infield hit of the game, over the
Bend right fielder's head, for a
home run.

In the fifth the Eugene team
kept up the scoring, bringing in
five runs on three hits, a walk,
three Bend errors, and a display of
fast base running.

Bend scored its lone tally in
the eighth on a triple by Reinhart
and a sacrifice by Higbee.
