HOOVER WITHOLDS VIEW

Bureau federation for a statement of his personal views on agriculture brought word from Mr. Hoover's office that he would not discuss issues until his notification. Meanwhile, Republican leaders, under the eye of the presidential nominee, went forward today with the perfection of their organization and campaign plans. August 18 was set for the notification exercises for Senator Charles Curtis of Kansas, the vice-presidential nominee.

Ceremony at Topeka
The ceremony will be held at Topeka, Kansas, home of the senator.

As part of the campaign in the East, Representative Tilson of Connecticut was named as head of the Eastern speakers' bureau, with headquarters in New York. He will work in co-operation with and under the main speakers' bureau in Chicago, in charge of Representative Newton of Minnesota.

While he is making no public pronouncements of his views, Mr. Hoover has conferred here with many party leaders from various sections of the country, including Luke Duffey, the Indiana farmer, who offered to deed his farm to President Coolidge. The agricultural situation has come in for considerable discussion at the conference and there is a feeling that the nominee will outline his position at some length either in his acceptance address, or in a speech on his return to Washington.

Platform Stand Seen
INDIANAPOLIS, July 10.—(AP)—William H. Settle, president of the Indiana Farm Bureau federation, declared today that failure of Herbert Hoover, Republican presidential nominee, to answer a telegram asking his personal stand on the farm relief question will be taken to mean that Hoover is going to stand by the platform as adopted at the Kansas City convention. The telegram sent to Hoover by Settle declared that "the agricultural plank of the Republican party is very unsatisfactory to the farmers."

HOOVER'S RELEASE CERTAIN
Exact Date of Resignation Accepted Yet to be Designated

SUPERIOR, Wis., July 10.—(AP)—President Coolidge intends to accept the resignation of Secretary Herbert Hoover from the cabinet, leaving the latter free to engage in his electoral campaign for the presidency, unimpeded by the duties which the commerce department would impose on him.

The exact date when the resignation will be made effective was said at the White House not to have been decided upon. It is understood, however, that this will depend chiefly upon the selection of a suitable successor to Mr. Hoover.

Will Confer Monday
The chief executive and the Republican nominee will discuss the matter next Monday when the latter will visit the summer White House. Mr. Coolidge, however, has already made up his mind not to ask Mr. Hoover to remain in the cabinet during the campaign, and it was said that President Coolidge, in arranging for the withdrawal of the commerce secretary, would hardly take into account the political situation and the prominent part played therein by Secretary Hoover. Before Mr. Coolidge came to this decision, reports had reached Superior from Washington that Secretary Hoover was very anxious that the administration should be in no way embarrassed by his campaign activities. He was represented as ready, however, to continue in his present capacity if the president desired to retain him in the cabinet.

DEMOCRATS ARE GATHERING
Southern Campaign Headquarters Are Urged by Robinson

NEW YORK, July 10.—(AP)—Members of the Democratic national committee gathered here today for the first meeting with the candidates for the presidency and vice-presidency to decide on a plan of battle.

Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas, candidate for vice-president, arrived a day ahead of his running-mate, Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, who broke his journey from Albany to attend the annual Boy Scout outing at Bear Mountain.

The Arkansas senator, who was permanent chairman of the Houston convention, issued a statement in which he urged the national committee to consider the advisability of establishing a southern headquarters to combat what he saw as an organized effort in several southern states to defeat the Democratic national ticket.

Will Visit West
In talking with reporters, Senator Robinson said that he could not speak with any certainty about his campaign activities until after tomorrow's meeting, but he said there was no doubt that he would make a number of speeches in the West and Middle West.

He remarked that he could say "in a general way" that the attitude of the party as expressed in the platform and in Governor Smith's telegram yesterday was sympathetic toward farm relief. He declined to outline the sort of legislation he thought would be desirable, but predicted that specific suggestions would be presented early in the campaign.

Lindbergh in Detroit
CHICAGO, July 10.—(AP)—Charles A. Lindbergh arrived here at 7:30 p. m. from Detroit. He left Detroit at 4 o'clock in a mail plane. He was alone.

After partaking of a light supper, the aviator re-entered his plane and took off. He headed in a southeast direction without disclosing his destination to field attendants. He was accompanied by a mechanic.

Columbia To Guard State
BOGOTA, Colombia, July 10.—(AP)—The bill for a social law, which yesterday was approved by the senate, with certain modifications, forbids the establishment of any kind of societies which, like any kind of communism, spread ideas against the state, encourage attempts against constitutional or-

ganization, or outrages against the Catholic religion, and tend to relax discipline within the army and police, or to destroy the home.

Pharmacists Elect
SALEM, July 10.—(AP)—S. A. Smith of Portland was unanimously elected president of the Oregon Pharmaceutical association here today at the second afternoon session of the association's convention. S. R. Stevenson of Eugene, president of the first vice-president, John T. White of Portland, second vice-president, John F. Allen of Corvallis, third vice-president, Frank S. Ward of Portland, was re-elected secretary, and John Lane, Jr., of Portland, treasurer.

SENATOR'S FUNERAL SET

CHAMBERLAIN TO BE BURIED
AT ARLINGTON

Services of Late Oregon Senator Will Be Held at His Apartments Today

WASHINGTON, July 10.—(AP)—Funeral services for ex-Senator George Earle Chamberlain of Oregon will be held tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock at his apartments, with interment later at Arlington cemetery.

The pallbearers will include Jefferson Meyers, of Portland, member of the United States of Portland, member of the interstate commerce commission; Dr. J. A. Cannon, his physician; Peter Nyce, Samuel W. McIntosh and Charles O. Swindler, member of his law firm here.

Rev. H. R. Squires of Norfolk, Va., has been selected by Mrs. Chamberlain to deliver the funeral sermon. It was he who married the Chamberlains in Norfolk two years ago.

Friends of the late senator pointed out today that while he is entitled to be buried in the national military cemetery as a past chairman of the senate military affairs committee, he also satisfied the requirement of active military service through having been called to duty as a lieutenant in the Oregon militia during the Banckroft Indian war of 1878, shortly after he went to that state to live.

craft. Three started to walk to land. Only the leader of the expedition has been brought out.

Fate in Balance
The fate of the other five survivors, all sick and one with a broken leg, depends upon the ability of the ice-breakers to reach their camp on a floe off Cape Leigh Smith.

Two aviators, the Russian Babushkin and Lieutenant Lundborg, went through extreme perils in their rescue efforts. Babushkin was adrift five days in the polar seas, then managed to make his way back to the ice-breaker Melagmin. Lundborg was rescued by another Swedish flier, Lieutenant Shyberg, who had helped bring out Nobile.

"The whole tragedy now seems the greatest in the history of modern Arctic exploration," said Lieutenant Lundborg. "Every day is now more or less foggy and planes are handicapped in their rescue work. It is now forty-one days since Malmgren and his mates set out on their fatal walk toward the land that seemed so near to them. They were poorly equipped in every way, and must certainly have perished."

Are Lost
"The Italians in the ship who drifted away after the gondola was torn loose, must also be considered lost. There were six men in that group."

"The dog team expedition of Captain Zora, with the Norwegians Varming and Vandensen, in all probability perished."

"There is very little hope of finding alive Roald Amundsen and the five men who were with him in the French plane piloted by Rene Guilbaud."

"The five survivors of the Italia under Lieutenant Viffler now have been camping on the ice forty-five days. The chief hope for their rescue is the ice-breaker Krassin."

Reports from the Krassin today said that she was 50 kilometers (about 31 miles) from the camp.

Amundsen Sought
The explorer, who with Captain Riser Larsen and Lieutenants Lutnowholm and Lambrecht, is seeking the Amundsen party in the stretches between Amsterdam Island and the Greenland ice. The hobby carries two hydroplanes, and it is intended to work toward the southwest until it reaches the vessel Helmand, chartered by the French government to look for the missing rescuers.

The general opinion here is that there is very little hope of finding Amundsen and his companions.

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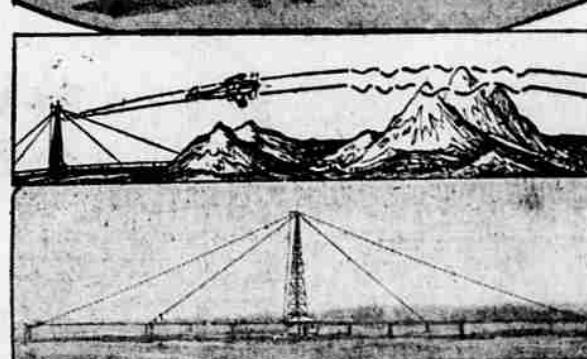
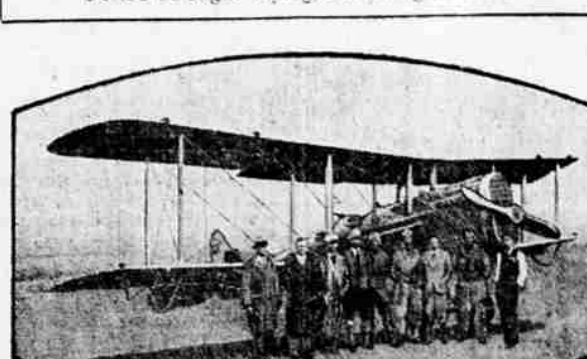
Striking Photo of Racing Mishap

RADIO EXPERTS BAFFLED BY LIGHT

They Find Mysterious Shifting in Radio Beacons During the Period of Night Flying, According to Tests



Experiments conducted by the Bureau of Standards in directing airplane flights by radio beacon flights by radio beacon have shown a mysterious shifting of the course indicator during night flying. Above the line used in the tests, while below is the College Park, Md., beacon station and directional antenna.

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—While success is marking experiments of the Bureau of Standards in directing daylight airplane flights by the radio beacon, a mysterious shifting of the course indicator in the planes at night is baffling the bureau's radio experts.

A series of night flights between New York and Cleveland, directed by the bureau's radio beacon at Bellefonte, Pa., and the New York stations, revealed serious errors. Instead of being stationary, there was a continuous shifting of the course over a wide range. The indicator in the plane, which informs the pilot that he is in the equidistant zone or on the direct course, rapidly moved about in an indefinite manner.

Shift Worse in Mountains
The shifting was found to be much worse in mountainous than in flat country, the fading of the general level of the signal being especially severe when the planes were over the Allegheny mountains. The cause responsible for this phenomenon at night is believed to be the same as that which produces the fading of signals of broadcasting stations.

On a night flight from Harrisburg, Pa., to Washington, using signals from the radio beacon at College Park, Md., no shifting was detected. There are no marked mountain ranges in this territory. Observations of the Bellefonte beacon were made at night on the ground at Washington, a distance of 134 miles. While the shift phenomenon was noticed, it was less pronounced than that observed in the air.

Found Accurate in Daytime
The Bellefonte beacon was found to be very accurate in guiding daytime flights between New York
