

“QUEEN” MARY IN COURT

BATTLE IN HOUSE OR DAVID GROWING WARMER

Injunction Sought in Effort to Get Leadership of Religious Colony

BENTON HARBOR, Mich., July 12.—(AP)—Mary Purnell, erstwhile “queen” of the “House of David,” today went to court with her fight for the leadership of the colony.

The widow of the late “king” Benjamin Purnell filed a petition for an injunction against H. T. Dewhirst, colony attorney, and leader of a rival faction seeking the cult leadership, to restrain him from selling or giving colony literature to the outside world.

It was regarded as her most important legal move, so far, to strip Dewhirst of authority in the colony.

Paul Perrott, one of “Queen” Mary’s supporters, filed suit for \$5,000 damages against Dewhirst and certain of his followers, as an aftermath of the riots in the colony Tuesday night and yesterday.

Perrott, who participated in the fight, and who was arrested on charges of petit larceny and resisting an officer, charged false arrest and malicious prosecution.

port from the airman, but other reports, conflicting somewhat in nature, have reached the capital. Direct messages from the Krassin told of Mariano and Zappi remaining with their dead comrade Malmgren for thirty days, not wishing to abandon him in the Arctic wastes, and hoping that some day a rescue would be effected, and Malmgren’s body would be returned to his homeland.

Another story was received that Mariano and Zappi testified to the great heroism Malmgren displayed before he died. His hand had been broken when the Italia collapsed, and his legs were badly frost bitten in the intense cold. This account quotes the survivors as saying that at his own wish Malmgren was left behind near Brock Island. Mariano and Zappi clambered on to a small iceberg which drifted with the wind, and they remained there until they were rescued.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in getting them aboard the vessel, the task occupying a full hour. Both men showed signs of intense suffering and though overjoyed at their unexpected deliverance, were in an exhausted condition. For thirteen days they had eaten virtually nothing and during the long period of their tramp across the ice prior to that were on meager rations.

HOOVER MEETINGS CALLED

Republicans to Gather at S. F. and Chicago at Work’s Call

WASHINGTON, July 12.—(AP)—Two conferences of western Republican national committeemen and committee women were called today by Chairman Work, one to be held in Chicago and the second to include far western states, to be held in San Francisco.

The chairman of the national committee will participate in both meetings which will be arranged to coincide with his trip to the Pacific coast early in August to attend the notification of Herbert Hoover as the Republican presidential nominee.

Announcement of the conferences at the national headquarters of the party today simply stated that the meetings would plan the campaign for the states in these sections.

Leaves For West  
Leaving Washington the first week in August for California, Mr. Work will stop over in Chicago for the first conference which will include committeemen and com-

mittee women of the middle western states from the Alleghenies to Denver. Two days will be devoted to the meeting. He will proceed without stop to California and confer there on Monday, August 13, after the notification ceremonies with the Pacific coast party leaders at San Francisco.

smith, members of the Democratic national committee left for home tonight, determined to lose no time in getting their state and local organizations in full steam operation.

For more than an hour in campaign headquarters at the Billmore, the presidential nominee discussed the outlook with the committee men and women, who yesterday, at his suggestion, made John J. Raskob, financial director of General Motors, their chairman and entrusted to him the management of the campaign.

Raskob, who earlier in the day had conferred with some of the committee members, was present until forced to leave to catch a train for his summer home in Maryland, where he plans to spend the week-end. In attendance also was Herbert Lehman, the committee’s new director of finance, Senator Gerry of Rhode Island, who has been placed at the head of the campaign advisory committee, and George K. Van Name, Smith’s pre-convention manager, who is expected to be in charge of eastern campaign operations.

Notification Not Talked  
Dates for the notification of both the governor and his running mate were not discussed, and it was indicated later that it probably would be some days before they would be fixed.

Committee members reported that the general opinion was that it would be wiser to establish regional headquarters in the south as Senator Robinson has proposed. Representatives from the “solid south” for the most part felt that there was no chance of losing any states in that section.

Farm Leader Acts

INDIANAPOLIS, July 12.—(AP)—William H. Settle, president of the Indiana farm bureau federation, late today requested Herbert Hoover, Republican presidential nominee, to “recognize” the farm problem and outline specifically a solution in his speech of acceptance at Palo Alto, Cal., August 11. Settle declared in the request which was sent by telegraph that the agricultural plank in the Republican national platform fails to deal with the problem.

that it is accordingly ready to sign this part in the form now proposed.”

Self Defense O. K.

The German reference is to Secretary Kellogg’s explanation in the note of June 23 that the revised preamble of the treaty “gives express recognition” to the principle that if a signatory state makes war in violation of the treaty the other powers are released automatically from obligations to that state, that it makes war in violation of the Locarno treaties also a violation of the new treaty and further, that the right of self defense would not be jeopardized by the multi-lateral treaty.

A favorable reply from France will be handed to American Ambassador Herrick in Paris within a few days, probably on July 14, which is Bastille Day, the French Ambassador, Paul Claudel, informed Secretary Kellogg late today. The ambassador said the reply would be an acceptance of the explanations and interpretations of the proposed treaty contained in the secretary’s note of June 23.
