DELHANTY WAS HOME RUN KING

Today's Sluggers Unable to Top Old-Timer's Four Homers in a Single Game

By FRANK G. MENKE "Huh," snort the old timers, whenever anybody discourses on the long distance swats being poked out on the baseball orchards of this era. "These sluggers of this generation are just a lot of exploded firecrackers in our lives, just a lot of bobwhisks in comparison with the super-slugger of all time, Ed Delahanty."

Used Old Ball "When Del made his record they didn't toss a new ball into play with every other pitch. They started the game with one ball and the game was finished with that same ball, unless it was knocked out of the park some time during the combat. Naturally, when a ball head to endure for anywhere from three to nine innings, the result was that it became dirty and black, and because of constant pounding, it quickly became soggy and was like a bundle of rags before the game was half done."

Furthermore, they didn't have the same kind of ball in use then that they have now. The ball in that era was just a baseball—not a bunch of specially prepared fabric and rubber, built for the definite purpose of enabling the boys to hit home runs. The parks were ball parks then, not band boxes. They didn't have any grandstands 250 feet or so from home plate.

Yet in face of all those conditions, a dead ball, dirty and hard to see, stands that were far removed from the plate, Del made four home runs in one afternoon

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hit the ball to deep center and beat the relay throw to the plate. "As he stepped to the plate for the fifth time, Bill Lange, playing center for Chicago, yelled at Delahanty and pointed derisive at the space between the two small clubhouse in center. Lange was jeering at Del by motioning him to try to hit the ball into that difficult spot.

Del saw Lange's motions and nodded his head. Terry shot up a ball that had everything on it to deceive Delahanty. But Del leaned into the ball before it broke, swung his huge bat and the ball went crashing with rifle shot force toward center.

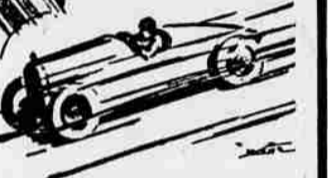
TENNIS TOURNAY HELD HARRISBURG AND HALSEY COMPETE ON COURTS

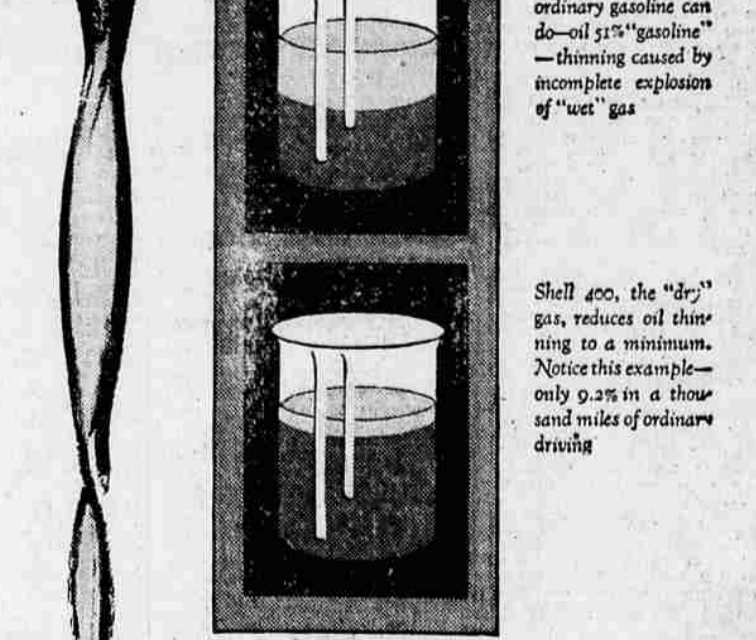
