Stroke in Gutta Percha Game

It's the little things that count—
little things like one stroke in the
gutta percha game.

Ask Johnny Farrell—he is en-
tirely familiar with the subject.
One stroke here and another
stroke there made this much dif-
ference to Johnny:

\$100,000!

Ordinarily an extra shot or two
in link duelling means almost noth-
ing. But in the recent open cham-
pionship it meant a kingship of
the club swinging realm.

Johnny started off in the 72
medal play as if he weren't going
anywhere in particular. After a
brief lapse of time—and also bril-
liance—Johnny suddenly steadied,
came along like a couple of choo-
choo cars and ended up in a tie
with Bobby Jones.

If Johnny had dubbed just one
shot—if he hadn't sunk that final
putt with one deft poke—he would
have ended as runner-up—and
that would have meant little or
nothing in the life of a golfing pro.

But Johnny didn't waste a stroke
in the final 72 holes and he ended
up all even with Bobby, neces-
sitating a piny off for the cham-
pionship.

It was a \$100,000 game in John-
ny Farrell's life. Victory meant
that he could cash in to that ex-
tent in triumph. In defeat he was

one stroke was a \$100,000 shot.
Johnny realized it, he measured
carefully, aimed carefully, steadied
his nerves, tapped the ball—and
in it rolled.

Farrell, by that one stroke, won
the play-off 144 to 143—and thus
a fortune is his to command.

Johnny was a caddy in the
younger years. He learned his golf
in the between-whiles. Gradually
he improved his game and, as he
grew into young manhood, he de-
cided upon a "pro" golfing career.

Magnetic in personality, with a de-
lightful sense of humor, a becom-
ing modesty, Farrell quickly be-
came popular even among the
idols.

"No finer fellow could have won
the title than Farrell."

So much is the sentiment of pros
and of amateurs and of the entire

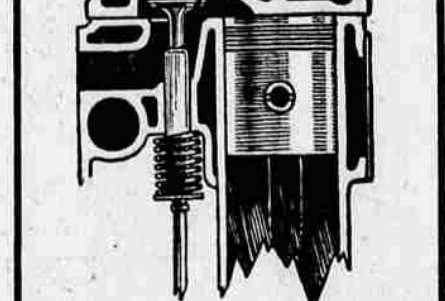

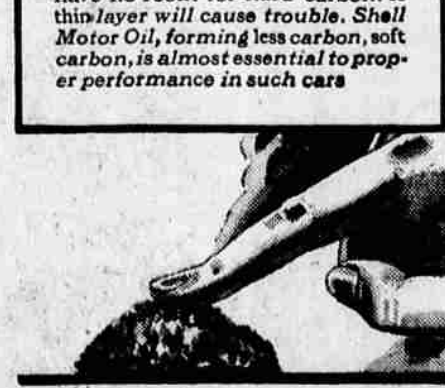
